"In every street where there are public wells, saitable persons shall be employed, in each ward, under the direction of he street commissioner and inspector, who shall, three days in every week, as long as it shall be judged expedient, pump a sufficient quantity of water, in order to cleanse the kennels; and where it may be necessary to conduct the watcucross the streets, canvas shose or wooderleaders shall be provided for the purpose Such inhabitants as are proved with purps in the yards at their dwellings, are ejoined to co-operate at the time when the public pumps are employed as aforesail and to cause the kennels before their ispeclive houses to be scoured during sur operation. And all families are, moz over, directed to cause the foot walk before their several houses to be swep and watered every morning and evenin during the remainder of the summer ason."
