Extract of a letter from an officer of the U. States Schooner Nautilus dated. " SYRACUSE, April 17.

" Every exertion is now making for the liberation of the prisoners in Tripoli.-What the plan of operation for the summer is, I know not. It is said by some, that the commodore (whose activity and enterprize does him great honer,) intends with the force he has collected, to bombard the town; others suppose a negociation for peace is on foot. The destruction of the Philadelphia made some difference in the treatment of the prisoner — not so much however as was expected, they were only more closely confined for a short time, but experienced no personal severity. They were all well when we heard from them last, and in as good spirits as their situation could admit. The Tunisians had purchased the ship and were to have taken her to Tunis in a few days.

"We had a brush not long since with the Tripolitan gun boats, who very prudently kept under the guns of

the batteries.

"I have much pleasure in informing you of several captures made by the different vessels of the squadron, the first of which I suppose you have before heard of, by the Enterprize with the Tripolitan Ambassador on board, and presents to the Grand Segnior .- An English brig by the Nautilus, and a ship by the Syren, the two last for a violation of the blockade. These captures have excited much surprise in this quarter; and it is said we have not a sufficient force to constitue a blockade, which is I assure you most rigidly enforced, and no vessel suffered to enter the port without a passport from the Commodore. The prize made by the Syren, is said to have a considerable quantity of spice on board.

P. S. Since writing the above it ry I uesday. has been determined to send the brig we captured off Tripoli, to the United States for legal adjudication. In copying an article from a morning paper, into the N. York Evening Post, relating to the ship John's having 106 shot fired at her by an English man of war off Sandy-Hook, the editor remarks:

"This presents a case that has excited much sensibility in the city, and called forth many indignant expressions of resentment. But it is always better first to investigate calmly the nature & extent of an injury received, and then we shall be the better able to repel it with firmness and to take the proper steps to obtain redress. What is the law of nations as applicable to

this case? "Without searching ships at sea (says Vattel) the commerce of contraband goods cannot be prevented. There is then a right of searching." The right to search is not at this day denied; the right of searching in one party however, necessarily implies the liability to be searched in the other for there cannot possibly exist two opposite and conflicting rights at the same time: It follows, that whenever the British have a right to detain an American vesset for this purpose, or what is equally lawful, for the purpose, of reclaiming British subjects, the American vessels on their part cannot have the right to refuse or evade the visit. And to this point the authority just qu' ted is sull and explicit. "At present, (says he) neutral ship refusing to be searched, would, from that proceeding alone be condemned as a lawfut prize." is unnecessary to multiply authorities to prove this; every body must at once preceive it is impossible that incompatible rights can exist at the same time. The question returns, had the Bruish ships a right to search the John? For if they had, Captain Patterson had no right to attempt to es. cape from the search; and his doing

so justly subjected him to be fired at. "We are of the number who deny the right of the British, under any pretence whatever, to lay off our port & search our vessels in their approach to the harbour. The authority of Vattel only speaks of search at sea. But, say the advocates for the British, it is all high sea beyond one marine league from the shore, and provided they they keep beyond that league they are within the authority. Not so: Azuni, whom we have so often quoted, and who descends to particular cases more than any other writer, is express that belligerents ought not, in any manner, to hinder the free and secure approach of neutral vessels to neutral ports. The conduct of the British, therefore, is illegal and an infringement of our national sovereignty, demanding prompt, and, if necessary, vigorous measures on the part of the American government, to obtain a redress equal to the injury sustained. Let us then indulge the hope that on this occasion the administration will shew itself worthy the confidence reposed in it by a great & free people."


