

industry. These Manufactures have had their monition in Great Britain. The advantages have been great to the nation. Even the Manufacturers have been zealous of their separate profits and only the duties imposed by government will make the spinners acquiesce that their threads should be woven in the kingdom. The property of Scotland diminished when the Scots adapted their own manufactures to the English colonial markets. The trade of Glasgow explains this fact. Before the accession, home-spun woolens, which were a coarse and household manufacture, in which each family was busy, without rivalry, or improvement, was the first employment. Coarse linens were exported for such fine linens as were wanted. As we recede from the north of Scotland, we in the same manner recede from this ancient state of their manufactures. From Inverness on the fifth of May, they export their flax, & the most common form is in white thread, and the few linens go to London. At Perth, to the linen they have added the cotton goods, and the annual amount of their linen and cotton was lately given at 220,000 sterling. In cotton manufacturers at Glasgow in 1791, were 15,000 looms, employing 135,000 persons, and the annual value of the goods was given at one and an half millions sterling. In New Lanark the employment was rendered so salutary, that it is said of 3000 children employed by Mr. Dale from 1785 to 1797, only 14 died while in that employment.

Mediterranean Passports.

Notice is hereby given, that it has been deemed expedient to change the form of the Mediterranean Passport issued to vessels of the United States; that from the eighth day of July next, those of the new form will be issued at the custom houses to every vessel, for which application may be made on a compliance with the terms prescribed by law and surrendering the former passport of which she may be possessed, if any, in which latter case no fees will be required for the exchange; and that by an arrangement agreed upon by the Barbary powers, with whom we are at peace, either the old or the new form of passport will be sufficient to protect the vessels of the United States, from capture until the 1st of July 1805, after which the old form of passport will be unavailable and the new one alone in use.
