We freely admit that the Gazette has  
given a wonderful display of the pumping  
powers it had in operation, for the pur-  
pose of scanning the proceeding of the de-  
mocratic republicans, relative to ward  
meetings: indeed, Mr. Brown's penetra-  
tion, in this instance, seems equal to the  
facility he usually evinces in coloring po-  
litical transactions:—and he appears to be  
so minute on the subject, that we might  
almost venture to believe he attended all  
the meetings that formed, were it not for  
our knowledge of his extreme modesty,  
which, we should suppose, prevented him  
from impudently and intrusively pushing  
himself into such meetings, when the no-  
tices for holding them, did not invite him.  
But, say some, if Mr. B. did not attend,  
from whence did he derive information,  
which seems to embrace every occurrence  
that transpired? To this we would  
answer 'hear say evidence is all that Mr.  
B. requires on such occasions! To mis-  
represent the administration, or the hon-  
est exertions of its friends, is it only  
deemed necessary to accomplish the pur-  
pose—no respect is paid to the means.

In order the better to make a stroke  
at those active republicans who counte-  
nanced the meetings, it is declared that  
"their despotism is palpable and abhorrent  
to every good man." But this could not  
have been advanced from a conviction of  
its truth; for the stamp of some of those  
who attended them gives the lie to the as-  
sertion. But, as it must be evident to all,  
that it is the policy of sham federalism  
to split our interest at elections; it thence  
follows that every plan which tends towards  
effecting the union of our energy will be  
scouted from that quarter. We are well  
assured, however, that the pigmy blasts  
of the Gazette, though directed to injure  
the private feelings of individuals, will  
not deter one freeman from the exercise  
of his rights. When it was the organ of  
national power, in times of terror and  
gloomy oppression, it could not curb the  
spirit of independence. At present, as an  
engine in this way, it can effect still less—  
for it only speaks the language of a dis-  
contented minority.

To that apathy which pervades the  
republicans, and to a persuasion on their  
part, that there is no danger—that their  
strength is sufficient to defeat the oppo-  
sition with all the stratagem which can  
be brought into play—we say, to these  
causes is to be attributed the too little  
attention which has been paid to ward  
meetings; and, not, as has been repre-  
sented, to an opinion, which would  
brand their proceedings with "turpitude  
and tyranny."

If the ward meetings should not be able  
to effect the laudable purpose, they were  
intended to produce; no doubt, it would  
furnish a source of lofty exultation to Mr.  
Brown and his friends; they would view  
it, perhaps, as a prelude to a farther tri-  
umph; and, it is possible, they may be  
gratified, if they can cause the nomination  
of a few more republican candidates!

On the subject of meetings, we heretofore  
gave an opinion, that, when so many  
candidates were held forth, they would  
have a tendency to establish a desirable  
union in favor of principle rather than men  
—and the Gazette's condemnation of them  
declares loudly in their favor.

The foregoing was prepared for the  
press, last evening, before the meetings  
took place in the 3rd 4th and 5th wards.  
And notwithstanding the malign at-  
tempts of the Gazette to bring such  
meetings into disrepute, by insulting the  
feelings of those who attended some of  
them, still, we have it in our power to  
say, that those which were held last  
evening, were more respectable in point  
of numbers than any which preceded  
them.—On this subject, we will now  
only add, that in complimenting Mr.  
Brown's great modesty as above, we  
have rather erred a little,—his attendance  
at the meeting of the 5th ward,  
without invitation, and more particu-  
larly, his rising with a laud force of 4 or 5,  
in favor of an adjournment, to frustrate  
and destroy the object of the meeting,  
proves that his modesty, at times, does  
not prevent him from displaying the  
most impudent assurance!
