The government of a King.—Volums from the pen of a master politician could not better describe the infatuation of a people who suffer themselves to be governed by a silly man called a King, than the succeeding London article. In others, age might form an adequate apology for the blunder, but King George was always either a fool or a madman. It reminds one of the principal character in a puppet show. The stupidity of the man may excite a smile of contempt here, but in England it must be an inexhaustible source of melancholy reflection. [Amer. Citizen.]

KING'S SPEECH.—The following, furnished by a London paper, is a more particular account of the faux pas committed by his Britannic majesty in reading his speech to the two houses of Parliament.

"In the delivery of the speech in the house of Lords, a singular and unprecedented circumstance occurred. We need not state to our readers that the speech to be delivered by the king is previously drawn up by his confidential advisers, who are responsible for its contents and that he holds a paper in his hand that no controversy may arise about the actual words which he delivers. It is always written out for the king in a large text, on account of his short sight, and the speech of the 31st ult. being long, occupied 7 or 8 leaves of paper. In reading it his majesty turned over two leaves instead of one, and thus unfortunately omitted two paragraphs in the speech. The distinct and special address to the gentlemen of the house of Commons, for the extensive provision they have made for the exigencies of the public service, was thus confounded with the general address to both houses of parliament on the great question of the war, and the prospect of the benefits to be derived from our successful exertions. Lord Melville, who stood very near his majesty on the foot-step of the throne, as well as the Lord Chancellor, remarked the oversight, but too late to prevent it, and his majesty, after correcting himself in a single word (aided, which he first read added) proceeded to the end of the speech."

High exultation is indulged by the federal prints at the success of their candid dates in the states of New Hampshire & Delaware. In the former state the federal ticket for representatives in Congress has prevailed by a majority of about eight hundred out of above twenty one thousand votes; and in the latter by a majority of three hundred and forty one, out of above 8400.—In the former state, the representatives have long since been federal, and there is consequently no new ground gained; and in the latter state, the division has for a number of years been so close that the opposite parties have alternately been victorious.

At the preceding election in New-Hampshire in the year 1802, the highest on the federal ticket had 6,135 votes; and the highest on the republican ticket had 4,104, leaving a federal majority of 2,031.
This year the highest on the federal ticket has 10,988 votes; and the highest on the republican ticket has 10,209; leaving a federal majority of 779.
Comparing the majority at this with that at the preceding election, we find a federal loss of 1252; although the total number of votes given at the last, is double that received at the preceding election. The comparative loss, therefore, is really double, amounting to about 2500.

With regard to the state of Delaware, the votes at the election of 1802, were for Rodney 3,421
Bayard 3,406

Republican majority 15
This year the whole number of votes has increased from 6,227 to 8,481; and Mr. Bayard has a majority of 361.
The most important view which these elections present is that which indicates the state of the public opinion. In this view, taken together, they offer the following result—
Federal loss in New-Hampshire 1,252
Federal gain in Delaware 561

which shows the loss of the federalists and the gain of the republicans.
It is but fair, in this view, to notice other changes recently made. In North Carolina and in Maryland a republican has been substituted in the room of a federal representative. So that while in Delaware, federalism has gained a member, republicanism has in the former states gained two members.

AGRICULTURAL.
A new method of heading Cabbages in the winter.
LAST fall, at the usual time of taking in cabbages, I had a number well grown, but which had no appearance of a head. I dug a trench on the southern declivity of a hill, about 18 inches wide and 20 or 24 inches

deep, and took 16 cabbages of the above description, and set them out in the bottom of the trench, in their natural position, with the roots well covered with sand: I then filed the trench with straw on each side of the cabbages, and laid straw over the tops of them to prevent the sand from getting in; then placed a rail over the middle of the trench to prevent any pressure on the cabbages, and completed the work by throwing on more straw and forming a ridge of sand over the whole to keep out frost and water. In the latter part of March I opened the trench and took out the cabbages, and found each one with a common sized head, white, solid, and well tasted.
