Bust of Hamilton.
Mr. Dixey, of New York, who has
lent his genius to the public taste to
hand down the fame with the likeness of
Hamilton, arrived here yesterday morn-
ing from Philadelphia with a cast taken
from the mould of a bust of that cele-
brated patriot, statesman and soldier.
The original bust was executed in mar-
ble by Ceraechis, an Italian sculptor of
established reputation, some years ago;
and all the lineaments of that celebra-
ted piece of sculpture are said to be so
accurately preserved in the cast as to be
distinguished in no other way from the
original bust but by the difference of the
material. Mr. Dixey proposes to re-
main in the city a few days, and will
exhibit his bust at Mr. Bryden's coffee
house, and take the subscriptions of
those who wish to patronize genius, or
to commemorate the virtues of the he-
ro and patriot, by having them embodi-
ed in a genuine likeness of the living
character.
Of Mr. Dixey we will only say, that
his professional merit, independent of
his success in taking off so striking a
counterpart of the original bust, has
recommended him to the Society of Cin-
cinnati of New York, who have selected
him to design and execute the monu-
ment to be erected over the ashes of
their departed brother in arms.

**Reported loss of the ship Vulture of
New-York.**
Extract of a letter directed St. George's
Be mada, 19th September, 1804,
to a general merchant in Norfolk.
"A Lascar came to town last night,
and reported that he lately belonging to
an American East India man (the
Vulture, Cap. Robinson) bound from
Bengal to New-York—that the ship
struck upon a rock to the westward of
these islands about a fortnight ago, &
was totally lost with her cargo;—that
the captain and the greatest part of the
crew perished; and that the mate,
with one white sailor and himself,
were the only persons saved; the
mate he says, he left very sick at the
house of a poor man in the country,
but he is unable to describe the place.
—They were 12 days in their boat af-
ter the accident before they landed—
These are all the particulars we are
at present in possession of respecting
this melancholy affair."

SHIP NEWS

PORT OF BALTIMORE.

The schooner Concord, Alexander
Thompson master, arrived at Barbadoes
after a passage of 30 days from this port
—Experienced a heavy gale of wind in
the lat. of Bermuda, and lost one man
overboard in the lat. of Antigua. Ex-
perienced a northern gale little inferior
to a hurricane which reduced the vessel
nearly to a wreck, the gale was so vi-
olent that he was under the necessity of
cutting-away the main boom & main sail,
and have every thing lashed on the quar-
ter deck. Upon a moderate calculation
the cargo must have been damaged at
least 25 per cent.—several American
vessels were reduced to a similar situa-
tion and others in that port were drove
on shore by its violence.
From Bryden's Marine List.
October 16.
Arrived last night, brig Spartan,
Cousell, 50 days from Bordeaux—

wine, dry goods, &c.—H. Messonier
and L. Pascault. Sailed from the riv-
er the 24th August, in company with
ship Sophronia, for New-York. Left in
the river ship Andrew, for Phila-
delphia next day. Left at Bordeaux
sch'r Phoenix, Reeves, for Baltimore,
in 8 or 9 days; ship Roborus, Mil-
likin, for do. in 10 days; Sch'r J. P.
Chaytor, and Chesapeake, Lee, for
do. in 20 days. September 25, long,
25, spoke ship Two Friends, McNair,
from Charleston for London. Sept.
6, lat, 53, long, 29, saw the wreck of
a large vessel, bottom up; appeared
to be clump built; could distinguish
no name or other marks.

Boston, October 10.
Yesterday arrived in the outer har-
bour, & immediately came up to town,
(during the gale) the sch'r Laura,
capt. Prefethen, 36 days from Surri-
nam—she made Cape Cod at 7 o'clock,
stood on and experienced the gal-
very heavy in the bay—came to an-
chor about one o'clock.
Same day arrived a number of ves-
se's coastwise, principally from the
Eastward.—The sloop Mary, capt.
Patterson, from Penopscot, was ac-
counting the number—he came out of
Portland on Monday afternoon, and
saw soon after, from 50 to 60 sail
standing to the westward (supposed
them coasters)—Capt. P. arrived
here about 3 o'clock, and reports that
he saw a number of sail a long dis-
tance astern of him in the forenoon,
and thinks that many of them could
not make a harbor before the gale
came on very violent.

Arrived at quarantine, about 2
o'clock, the brig Eunice, capt. Smith,
from Surinam—she about 4 o'clock
drove from her anchorage, and drifted
up into Brantree Bay, where she
grounded about 9, without receiving
any material injury.—The other ves-
sels at quarantine, five in number,
went adrift about the same time; a-
mong whom were (we expect) Capt.
Crawford, from St. Thomas, and
capt. Little, from Martinique; the
others unknown—we are in hopes
they experienced the same good fate
of the Eunice.

Very serious fears are entertained
as to the fate of those vessels which
were unfortunate enough to be to the
westward of Cape Cod on Tuesday,
that have not arrived.
Philadelphia, October 15.
Came up from the Lazaretto.
Brig Dominico, Anderson, Marti-
nique; Conquest, Kenny, New Orleans;
Success, Hardy, Point Petre.
Cleared, sch'r Friendship, Pendleton,
Newbern; Matilda, Wallace, do. Sea
Flower, Bird, New York.
Brig Ann, Lord, schooner Eliza and
Katy, Gardner, with several other ves-
sels, in all 12 sail went to sea on Thursday
morning—they lay at Reedy-Island dur-
ing the gale and sustained no injury.
Schooner Sally, Morrison, of this port,
from Demerara, is wrecked on the
Brandy-Wine Shoals, vessel and cargo
lost, crew saved.
Schooner Isabella, Pitts, from Boston is
ashore on Cape May, both masts gone
and bilged.
The cargo of the Isabella is landed
with very little damage.
Schooner Happy Return, Sulger, and
Polly, Collision, from St. Thomas, are
below.
On Monday night last, in a hard gale
of wind at S. E. the sch'r Lana Maria,
captain Wm. Stokely, from New York,
for Brandywine, with 2000 bushels of
wheat, was drove ashore on Abescome
beach, the cargo damaged, the crew
saved, and it is probable the vessel may
be got off.

Norfolk, October 11.
Arrived, brig Albert, captain Webb,
26 days from Surinam. Left there the
brig Globe, Williams, of Philadelphia;
schooner Mercury, Smith, of Norfolk;
brig Hope, Patterson, of Providence. The
brig Mark and Mary, Jenkins, of New-
York, last from Cayenne, arrived in Sur-
inam river the 10th September. Spoke,
September 26, in lat. 23, 30, long. 66
30, the pilot boat schooner Eliza, from Bal-
timore, bound to St. Domingo. Oct-
ber 6, in lat. 34, 25, long. 75, 20, spoke
the British brig Polly and Susan, Cromerty,
for Baltimore.
