MEETING OF CONGRESS.
The legislature of the U. States will meet before the constitutional day this year. Persons who may have business with congress may be served by the information, that the meeting of that body will commence on MONDAY, NOVEMBER FIFTH, and that it must end on the 3d of March, 1865.

A Bordeaux price-current of the 17th of August, represents the state of that market as very inviting to commercial enterprise.—Nantz market was proportionably flattering.

MARYLAND ELECTION.
Though unable to give the result of the entire elections, the following statement will exhibit the progressive state of republicanism in that state:
Of the representatives to CONGRESS elected,
5 were republican,
2 federal.
Of the former Messrs. Nicholson, Nelson, Moore, MacCreery, and Archer were elected without opposition; Mr. Covington by a majority of 83 over Mr. Vachon, likewise republican; and Mr. Maguder by a majority of 204 over Mr. Plater.
Of the latter Mr. Campbell was elected without opposition, and Mr. Charles Goldsborough by a majority of 574.

The present representation consists of six republican and three federal members.
Of the members of ASSEMBLY, the following exhibits the federalists elected.

The federal member elected for Talbot was chosen by republican votes; & in Allegany two republican members were chosen. This is the first instance in which that county has sent a republican member.

All the other counties, except Caroline, * have been heard from, and they send republican members: a mounting to 52.
This result gives a larger republican majority in the Legislature than has heretofore at any time existed; and we are assured that the relative republican votes in every county have advanced. [Nat. Int.]

Arrived, sch'r Patriot, Blunt, 32 days from Martinique and 24 from Antigua—sugars, molasses and coffee—To L. H. G. Sworth. Sailed from Martinique 16th Sept. Left at Marine, brig Benjamin and Nancy of Newburyport & sch'r Roboras, Lambert, of Salem. At Pilot, brig Tryal, Whitey, of Salem, and ship Hope, Stock, on shore, likely to get off. At St. Peres, sch'r Caroline, Coleman, of Baltimore on shore, and reported in the papers to be lost—but a gentleman from thence informed Capt. B. that the ship had sailed from Baltimore, had run a shore, and was the only one missing the unfortunate that would be saved. A St. Peres, brig Auray, S. P., of Snowhill last from New York. Patty, Clark, Boston; Good Intent, McCalmont, Philadelphia; Conchamus, Davis, Norfolk; Leah Cherub, Portsmouth; Almira, Smith, N. Haven; Traveller, —, Portland; Eagle, Baker, Wilmington; S. By, Hubbard, Middletown; Lydia and Polly, Bacon, Boston; Minerva, Doane, ditto; Henry, Goodridge, Two-Friends, Motley, Portland, and 4 sail of Americans at Fort Royal, names unknown.

All the above vessels reported to be ashore, and lost vessels and cargoes. October 1, lat. 27, long. 66, spoke brig Traveller, Stelton, 9 days from Martinique, bound to Boston. 3d, lat. 38, long. 69, schooner Jefferson, from Philadelphia, to St. Domingo. The Captain reports that the night before he left St. Johns, a hot press took place among the mates and seamen of every nation, and some American masters were impressed, but liberated by the interference of the consigne.

Also, English brig Sukey & Polly, Cranard, 32 days from Kingston, Jam. Sugar & Coffee—H. Thompson. Left here 15th September, a Baltimore sch'r taking ballast, and English sch'r Mary, Carrea, bound from Baltimore.
The brig Alert, Smith, from Baltimore for Curacao, was spoken on the 19th ult, in lat. 33, 42, long. 69, 30—out 5 days.

Schooner Venus, Bryant, in 17 days from Wilmington, N. Carolina. Passengers, Messrs. Anderson, Holmes, Howard, Kelly, Levy, and Martin.
Schooner Dolphin, Dockendorf, of Bristol, in 23 days from St. Pieves, Martinique. Passengers in the Dolphin, Captain Baker, of the brig Eagle, of Wilmington, Delaware; captain J. Davis, of brig Cincinnati, of Norfolk; captain John Selby, of the brig Aurora, of Snow Hill; and captain Tudor, of the brig Sally, Hubbard, of Middletown, which vessels were lost at Martinique in the gale of the 3d and 4th ult. The above gentlemen mention, that of the 14 American vessels wrecked at Martinique during the gale, not a life was lost, owing to the humane exertions of the inhabitants, who not only exerted themselves to save their lives, but actually opened a subscription and raised money for such American seamen as were in distress.
Brig Perseverance, Sillick, in 9 days from Baltimore.

The British sloop Polly, Darnel, in 30 days from Grenada, and 18 days from Turks Island. Left at Grenada, a ship belonging to New York, from Teneriffe,

to sail for Turks Island and New York in a few days, and an American ship, with flour, which vessel had stopped there to try the market; not liking it, she sailed for Trinidad, but on her passage was dismasted in a squall, and put back to Grenada, where she sold her flour at 11 dollars. There had been no gale at Grenada; but several vessels had been driven ashore in the late gale at Barbadoes.

Returned last evening, on account of bad weather, and anchored at Staten Island, the ship Flora, bound to London.

Cleared ships Oneida, Chief, Farrell, London; Polly, Do lan, Guadaloupe; brig Happy Couple, Story, West Indies; sloop Frederick, London, Savannah; Sally, Hurlburt, St. Augustine.
