Betsey, Little, Martinique. The three last vessels are on shore at Squantum; but we do not learn that they have received any material damage. The two last had completed their quarantine.
In the Equator came passengers, capt. Downce, and 3 seamen, of the ship Minerva, wrecked at Martinique.
In the Betsey came passengers Mr.

Fowler and one man, late of the schr. Henry; Mr. Harris, late mate of schr. Sally; Mr. Lemon, late 2d mate of schr. Sally, of Middletown; Increase Newel late of schr. Caroline, of Baltimore, Trefethen of schr. Little Calrub, of Portsmouth; which vessels were wrecked at Martinique.
