

far as this alters the case, the difference is in her favour. She is wasting in war nearly as she would have wasted in peace; we are wasting in war, who would have been getting powerful in peace.

New Beacons in the Baltic.
On the 20th of last November, the first Beacon upon Cockerbeers, the want of which has caused so much damage among shipping, was renewed, being elevated 105 English feet higher than the surface of the water, and lighted with reflectors, after the English manner. In the same way, all the Russian Beacons, upon the coast of the Baltic, have also been fitted up; by which means the dangerous shores of the Island Orfel, so fatal to commerce, may in future be avoided. At each of these Beacons, a captain of the fleet is stationed, to whom the management of affairs relative thereto is entrusted. Every new undertaking of this nature will be announced to the public without loss of time. The zeal of the august head of the empire affords reason to hope for the further extension of such important plans, which the honor to the nation, and the most essential to trade in general. The actual illumination of these Beacons will take place every season, as soon as ever the breaking of the ice is complete, in May, and continue to burn as long as the navigation is open.

BANKS OF THE MAINE, Aug. 29.
The Loire frigate, captain Maitland, has captured and carried into Cork, the Blonde privateer. She is remarkable for having taken the Wolverine, as well as for the mischief she has done our trade in the war.
A messenger arrived from Constantinople, with dispatches, which are said to contain an account of the Rebel Turks having entered Belgrade, and put all the inhabitants to death.

For the information of the voters for electors of President and Vice President, we have deemed it proper to publish such extracts from the election laws as may be necessary to facilitate the business of the ensuing election.
For the purpose of choosing ELEVEN Electors of President and Vice President the state has been by law (1862, c. 70 sec. 2) divided into NINE districts as follow:

- THE FIRST DISTRICT**
Is composed of St. Mary's county, Charles county and the Fifth election district of Prince Georges county, generally called Piscataway district, which elects ONE elector.
- THE SECOND DISTRICT**
Is composed of Prince Georges county, except Piscataway district, and the third and fourth election districts in Montgomery county, called the Montgomery courthouse election district and Thomas's election district, which elects ONE elector.
- THE THIRD DISTRICT**
Is composed of the remainder of Montgomery county, Anne Arundel county and the city of Annapolis and city of Baltimore, which elects TWO electors.
- THE FOURTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of Frederick county, Washington county and Allegany county, which elects TWO electors.
- THE FIFTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of Baltimore county, which alone elects ONE elector.
- THE SIXTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of Harford county & Cecil county, which elects ONE elector.
- THE SEVENTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of Kent county and Queens Anne's county, which elects ONE elector.
- THE EIGHTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of Talbot county, Caroline county and the first election district of Dorchester county, which elects ONE elector.
- THE NINTH DISTRICT**
Is composed of the remainder of Dorchester county, Somerset county and Worcester county, which elects ONE elector.

The electors shall be residents of the respective districts for which they may be elected.
The election will be held in the several counties in this state and the cities of Baltimore & Annapolis on the SECOND MONDAY in Nov. next (TWELTH.)

The editor of the Washington Federalist has made the result of our election, for city representatives, in the state legislature, a matter of superabundant joy; but to prevent a wrong interpretation of it, we shall pay it some little attention to-morrow. We hope, the issue of the approaching election, for electors, will not furnish another cause of triumph for Mr. Rind and his friends: Notwithstanding, we are obliged to confess, prospects to prevent it, are not so flattering as we could wish—Division, the too powerful source of every hope, with our political opponents, in hideous form again appears; and, if permitted to exist, it may prove the cause of a shameful defeat. On this occasion, however, we sister republicans that a sufficient

warmth of patriotism glows in the bosoms of those concerned, to produce the necessary and proper adjustment, EARLY enough to effect that union of efforts, which will insure the votes and commanding tone of this district, in favor of Jefferson and Clinton.

The following article from Bradford's (Philadelphia) paper, of Tuesday, would lead us into a belief that the British government had some idea of respect to the neutrality of a free and independent nation, by recalling the famous Bradley from his New York blockading stations. Extract of a letter from London, dated August 17, 1864.
The strongest measure possible has been taken to testify the disapprobation of government, in respect to the conduct of the captain of the Cambrian frigate, by sending out captain Beresford to supersede him; captain B's commission is signed to day for that purpose—so that you should have every reason to be satisfied with the disposition of our government. Our officers are much mistaken in thinking that they raise their importance, and that of their country, by taking upon themselves to set the laws and neutrality of other countries at defiance.

The following from the New York Morning Chronicle, of Monday last, however, would assure us that, "one of our best friends," whom Mr. Neilson, of New York, invited "to protect our commerce" will continue to favor us with his "friendship and good offices," which it is his Britannic majesty's ardent desire should be plentifully "heaped upon us."
"Rumor had on Friday last, recalled from their command on the American station, the officers of the Leander and Cambrian British ships of war, and had imported in the Queen Charlotte Packet, then hourly expected a supply of navy officers to succeed them.—The origin of this report has not been traced, but it has probably arisen from a circumstance pretty generally understood, that captain Skene of the Leander has requested of the admiralty permission to return home.
"The Packet arrived on Saturday, but brought no officers as expected."

The Hudson Bee, of Tuesday last, says, we hear there has been good sleighing a few miles westward. And at New Lebanon, in this county, they have had snow twice already. As there was some there in May, they have been but four months this year without snow, a remarkable circumstance in this latitude, 42 degrees north.

British Packet *Queen Charlotte*, captain Madge, in 45 days from Falmouth to Halifax, and 13 days from Halifax to this port. Captain Madge, on the 22d

of August, in a squall, saw three British outward bound Indiamen capture a French privateer brig of 14 guns: October 17, spoke a brig from Boston for Norfolk. Next day, 8 or 9 leagues East of Sandy Hook, spoke the ship *Ladona*, of Gloucester, 42 days from Liverpool for New York.
At quarantine, the brig *Swift*, King, in 25 days from Curacao. Left no American vessels. Spoke, October 2, in lat. 21, long. 69, Spanish schooner *Good Mother*, 40 days from Havana for Laguna, and supplied her with water, &c. 7th, in lat. 38, long. 73, brig *Mary* from Philadelphia for St. Croix. 18th, in sight of Egg Harbor, ship *Juno*, from round Cape Horn, for New York. Off the Capes of Delaware, on soundings, fell in with the masts of a brig and spars lashed together, which no doubt had been placed thus by distressed seamen from a wrecked vessel.
Schooner *Seaman*, Weymouth, from Richmond, and 4 days from Norfolk. Passengers, Mr. Dickinson, Mr. Hill, two Mr. Andersons, Mr. Martini, and others. Came out of the Capes with about 42 sail, several of which were for New York. Just to the southward of the Capes of Delaware, spoke the ship *New York*, 30 days from Norfolk for New York; she took a Philadelphia pilot, and anchored on Thursday evening at Cape Henlopen, short of water and provisions.
Ship *Juno*, Bunker, in 112 days from the Coast of Chili. Left, in the Pacific Ocean, ships *Pers-veranda*, Coffin, of Nantucket, in lat. 30. 8, July 10, with 750 barrels oil; *Caro*, Folger, with 800; ship *Aera*, Gwin, 140; *Uacle* Toby, Swain, 100; *Stirling*, Starbuck, 130; *Diana*, Waterman, 130; *Winslow*, Paddock, 1100; *Magnet*, Paddock, 150, and 700 skins; *Minerva*, Jones, 25,000 skins; *Lady Adams*, Fitch, 80,000 skins; and *Wanderer*, Fitch, 30,000. Captain B. spoke on the coast in March last, the English ship *Edwinton*, in distress, with the loss of her rudder, put into Conception; and was afterwards detained there by the Spaniards, hearing of war. Spoke, in lat. 5 1/2, N. long. 45, schooner *Sampson*, Cox, 35 days from Baltimore, for Surinam. October 4, in lat. 22, 50, long. 65, 30, brig *Iris*, Smith, 10 days from Wilmington, N. C. for Guadalupe. October 14, in lat. 35 1/2, long. 72, sloop *Patience*, Crowell 7 days from Washington, N. C. for New York, in distress, her sails torn in pieces, and lost 75 barrels of tar and turpentine, short of provisions—gave her a supply. October 15, in lat. 37, long. 73, a schooner, 14 days from Havana for Rhode Island, having experienced six gales, and had her fore mast sprung. On Friday last, in lat. 39, 50, ship *Voltaire*, Bowen, 8 weeks from St. Petersburg for Philadelphia. The brig *Mentor* Jacob's, of Philadelphia, was cast away June 15, at Conception.
At quarantine, the ship *Leander*, Lewis, in 30 days from Port au Prince.
Brig *Ontario*, Stevenson, in 64 days from Bordeaux. On the Banks of Newfoundland, spoke ship *Mentor* Defano, 5 days from New York for Amsterdam.
