Pinckney had withdrawn from the Court of Madrid, and had arrived at Cadiz .- This circumstance gave rise to the apprehension of a rapture between Spain and the United States.

Captain Rea, from the Streights, passed in sight of the British fleet bleckading Toulon, but was not boarded. On the 2d of September, met the United States frigate Congress, going into Gibraltar, bound to Tripoli. The Essex trigate remained at Gibraltar, as a check upon the Moors, whose pacific disposition towards the United States was very doubtfu!

Captain Rogers, who arrived at Boston, on the 17.h instant, in 50 days from Gibraltar, informs, that Mr Gavino, the American Consul, on the day previous to his sailing, had received information of Commodere Preble's having actually gone against Tripoli with a formidable squadron Dispatches to our government, announcing this event, were preparing by Mr. Gavino; but the wind springing up fair, captain Rogers put to sea without them.

Captain Osgood, who arrived at Boston the same day, in 43 days from Gibraltar, also micrms, that the frigate John Adams had arrived at Syracuse, and sailed im media ely to join Commodore Preble's squadren, who had been off Tripoli for several days, but had not attempted any thing, on account of the bad weather.

By the ship Jupiter, captain Law, which sailed from London the 6th of September, we have received London papers to the evening of the 3d of that month; also Lloyd's lis's and pricescurrent.

The contents of our London papers are interesting. The invasion appears actually to be on the eve of being attempted.

The news via Philadelphia, of the embarkation of French troops, and of a heavy firing heard in the English Channel turns out to be an attack by the English frigates on the French gun-boats at Boulegne.

The total amount of the French force assembled between Boulogne and Calaisi 15 stated in a London print to be 180,000 men completely equipped and ready to embark.

In twenty four hours notice a force of 100,000 men can be collected on any point of the British coast opposite the enemy.

The story of the altempt to poison Louis XVIII on a strict examination proves to be an invention of Coulon, to obtain money. He and his wise are said to have been arrested. General Lake has been raised to the

dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland. FRANCIS II. Emperor of Germany,

has assumed the title of Hereditary Emperer of Austria. Our London papers by the Mary, contain an extract from the Vienna Gazette of August 15, announcing the result of secret cerrespondence and negociations in regard to acknowledging the imperial family of France. It states that "the family of Bonaparte is acknowledged as such, and the title of HEREDITARY EMPEROR GF AUSTRIA is acquired by the Arch-ducal house," The Vienna Gazette adds, "new letters of credit of his apostolic, royal & imperial majesty to the Emperor of the French will be sent without delay to Count Cohentzel.

A formal patent, dated Vienna the 11th Aug. is published, which we have not room to insert, in which the Empeor, quoting the example of the imperi I court of Russia in the preced. ing century and that now given by the new sovereign of France, assumes for the house of Austria, as far as relates to its-independent states, the title and dignity of Hereditary Emperor of Austria.

The above event is of much importance, as it may be considered preparatory to a consolidation of the differ. ent principalities of the Germanic empire. It also shews as perfect understanding between the courts of Paris and Vienna.

Extract from a letter from Hamburg, dated 11th August, 1804.

GIBRALTAR, Sept. 1. The intelligence from Malaga continuing to be more and more alarming, the commander in chief has issued the following proclama ion .-

Head Quarters, Gibraltar, Aug. 27. 1803. Information having been received that a malignant fever has again made its appeurance in Malaga, the commander in chief feels it his duty, for the better security of the health of the inhabitants & troops of this garrison, to direct that, commencing with to-morrow, and until further orders, all communication with Spain, both by sea and land, shall be cut off. No person, therefore, is to pass the barriers except the king's workmen or people with carts, mules or barricos, loaded or going with stones, sand or water, nor are these to go to the northward of the road leading to the Devil's Tower, except to unload rubbish.

LONDON, August 25 to September 2. A negociation, which derives considerable interest from the peculiar state of continental politics, is now pending between Austria and France: it relates chiefly to a variety of unsettled marters in Italy, and to certain petty German Princes. Bonaparte Las hitherto evaded all discussion on the subject, while Austria has with equal constancy demanded their adjustment. The business has become involved in a good deal of difficulty from the pertinacy of each party; and to this is to be attributed Lauriston's recent journey to Vienna.

Yesterday some letters reached town from Guernsey via Southampton. We received a Jersey paper by this Channel, but it does not afford a single article worth extracting. At Guernsey they were expecting an attack, to which operation they imagined the bustle on the enemy's coast to be directed.

Yesterday the Gottenburg mail of the 24th uit reached town. We learn by this conveyance, that the Russian fleet, under the command of rear admiral Crown, had orders to cruize in the Baltic and German Ocean, but had not passed the sound.

A letter from Petersburg, dated the 11th August says, "the Russian army is supplied with every thing necessary for immediately taking the field. The emperor, in his present review of the different camps, has made numerous promotions. Every thing indicates the probability of a winter campaign both by land and sea-

" As soon as Bonaparte's ultimatum, which has been categorically demanded by the emperor, arrives, the politics of this court will assume a decided tone, and such has been the prudent foresight of this government that it is prepared to set three hundred thousand men in motion at an hour's notice."

Bremen, after a close blockade of five weeks, is stated to have been obliged to submit to the forced loan of one million of dollars, imposed by the French army in Hanover. It is probable that the corps assembling at Lauenburg, is intended to lay Lubec and Hamburg under similar contributions.

Our readers will smile at the pompous titles now assumed in the French Official Correspondence. The appellation 'Citizen," is now discarded completely, and the ministers are addressed by the title · My Lord !

After the afore going news was prepared for the press, we received London papers to the 11th of September, by the ship Mary, captain Wood, in 40 days passage from Liverpool, containing the following important intelligence:

London, September 10 .- The Hamburg mails arrived yesterday. The intelligence which they bring is surperceded by accounts of a more recent date, which we have received by the Paris papers to the 2d, and the Dutch to the 6th inst.

Those papers contain a great variety of important information, but the article which may be considered as particularly interesting at this momentous crisis, when the state of Europe, and with it the condition of civilized society, trembles in the balance, relates to the certainty of an immediate rupture between Russia and France 1-M. D'Oubril, the Russian charge d'Affaires, has quitted Paris.

His departure is not mentioned in the French official paper, but the fact admits of no doubt, as it is inserted in several of the smaller Paris papers. Whether it was in consequence of an unsatisfactory answer to the Note which he was understood to have presented shortly after Bonaparte had left the capital, or some peremptory order lately received from his court, we have no means of ascertaining, as the fact is barely mentioned, without any comment whatever.

Bonaparte, after having passed six weeks in reviewing and marshalling his troops, and arranging all his immense preparations for the invasion of this coun try, bas at length taken his departure from the coast. Most of his Ministers, and all the foreign Ambassadors, had left Paris, for the purpose of meeting his

Imperial Majesty at Aix In-Clapelle, and of witnessing all the honors and flattery which the constituted authorities will, no doubt, profusely pour on the modern Charlemagne. The period of his stay in that city is not mentioned, but there is no prospect of his immediate return to the coast, as we find that he was to continue his journey to Boon, Coblentz, and the principal cities of the newly acquired departments on the left bank of the Rhine. Upon whom the command of the army of England, and the proud distinction of planting the bonnet rouge, or the French Imperial Eagle, on the tower of London, is to develve, ad interim, we are unable to conjecture from any thing that occurs in the Paris Journals. Indeed we should not be surprised if the motion of the French army to this side of the water had been postponed sine die, for we find that considerable preparations have been making at Strasburgh for the reception of his Corsican Majesty, from whence it was expected he would repair to Paris. The anniversary of his usurpation (the 9th of November) is only two month distant, and as it is generally supposed that he means to constitute it also the anniversary of his coronation, it is not very probable that he will in the interval, expose his army to the possibility of any disasters which may affect his present popularity. According to private letters from the

Hague af the 1st inst. as soon as his Majesty the King of Sweden received information of the libel which Bonaparte caused to be inserted in the Moniteur. he immediately dispatched a courier to his charge d'affaires at Pa. is, Mr. Ackerblad, with orders for him to quit France without taking leave. At the same time orders were sent to Stockholm intimate ing to Bonaparte's charge d'affairs there, that his presence could be dispensed with in Sweden. All political relations have therefore ceased beiween Sweden and France; but the Swedish Consul, G.n. M. Signeul, continues still to reside at Paris for the protection of commerce of the Swedish subjects with France. It is, however, supposed upon the continent, that Napolean, in a fit of passion, will soon order him away, and declare war against Sweden.

Another report is, that the Russian, Sweden and Danish ministers, have quit

Our private correspondent at Hamburg has furnished us with the following communication :--" Gen. Berthier is da y expessed in this city from Hanover to demand, under the pretence of a loan, another pecuniary con rebution of 1,500,000 marcs banco. The French camp near Lunenburgh is to receive considerable reinforcements.

" The king and queen of Sweden intend to spend the winter at Stralsund. A frigate has been ordered from Stockbelm to carry home the Prince Royal. His Majesty persists in refusing to acknowledge Benaparte as Emperor of Fra: ce. The Swedish Journals, when they aliade to him, uniformly style him the soi-disant En:peror."

Lord Keith sailed yesterday morning in the Monarch to join the squadron of Bonlogne. Lord Melville and captain Hope have accompanied his Lordship. for the purpose, it is supposed, for ascertaining the state of the preparations along the French coast.

Constantinople, July 21 .- In the insurrection which broke out in Aleppo, in Syria, against the new Pacha, in consequence of his burthening the people with oppressive exactions, above 2000 persons lost their lives; 20,000 Janissaries first rose, and were joined by 60,000 partisans of the Sheriffs, and entered the castle of the Pacha, in which he bravely desended himself, but was taken by storm.

Leydon, August 30 .- Reports are circulated at Paris of a triple alliance, offensive and desensive, between the emperor of Austria and France, and the king of Prussia. Time will shew whether there is any truth in them.
