Extract of a letter from Havre to a gentleman in this city, received via Norfolk,

HATRE, August 4, 1804. "I again drop you a life to inform you we continue in the land of the living, though our neighbors have, at different times been sending passports for the other world, in the form of bomb shells. The first serious attack was about 10 days since when they lay off the town, in a line with my house. The first 4 shells passed over it as I was looking out, the last of which barely passed over the house and fell in a house across the street. Not less than 40 sell in different parts of the town, yet the damage was not very considerable.

"On the evening of the 1st inst, they took their station on the entrance of the Seine, where we are less desended; but they did little mischief. The next morning (the 2d) they took the same station, but rether nearer, and with some effect. One shell fell a few inches short of my house, entered the adjoining and struck the partition wail, a part of which it forsed on the staircase; fortunately it did not burst or Mrs ---, must have been kil led as she was just on the landing at the time. They continued upwards of four hours, when the tide had fallen so much as to oblige them to haul off.

"The force was 5 bombs, 7 frigates & 3 cutters—they received but little damage, as the gun boats were all ranged abreast of the town, & for the most part out of the reach of the shot. One gun brig, captain Bosque, got under way, stood up the Seine and boldly attacked a gun brig, that was protected by a frigate and cutter and advanced so near as to fire musketry at times. I expected she would nave been captured; she however carried away the main top mast of the brig and forced her to haul off-The gun brigs well managed, are capable of doing much-

I" --- I do not see any good that can result to them, even should they succeed in destroying the town. With a superior fleet towns on a sea board may always be destroyed; but instead of producing a good effect and bringing about peace, it only tends to heighten animosity."


