NEW YORK October 26-27. BRUTAL INHUMANITY.—As a Mr. Thomas Ten Eyck was diving furiously through Broadway yesterday, between 12 and one o'clock, he suddenly turned down Reelers-street, and run over a child (a fine boy of about 8 years of age) of Mr. Monteiro's; fractured his skull, and otherwise injured him.—Yet the brutal conduct of this man was such, that he never stopped one moment, but drove on as if nothing had happened. The humanity of a Mr. Myers from Virginia, and others, coming up at the moment, took care of the child, and carried him to doctor Hosack's, where his wounds were dressed, and where he now lies dangerously ill. BARON HOMPESEHU ex-grand master of Malta, who lives retired at Civita-Castellana, has received intelligence (according to accounts from Genoa) that the Emperor of the French has assigned him an annual pension of 300,000 francs. Yesterday being the day set apart for the celebration of the Queen of Great Britain's birth, the same was observed by the British ships of War Leander and Cambrian, lying at the Hook, who were elegantly dressed on the occasion, and at one o'clock fired a royal salute. A letter from New-Orleans of the 22d ult. mentions, that the ship Louisiana was to sail for New-York on the 22d of September. The same letter adds, that the fever prevailed there to an alarming degree—there was scarcely an American merchant left in the place. Among the deaths are Mrs. Gurley, of Boston, Mr. Gelston and Mr. Somerville, of New-York.

A gentleman from Tortola, informed captain Riley, arrived here yesterday from St. Thomas, that a St. Vincent privateer had picked up the brig Charleston Packet, of New-York, and towed her into Tortola. She had her jolly boat hoisted up astern, the long boat hanging along side in the tackles, nothing remaining, but her stern, stern post and keel; her cargo in good order, and sold for a handsome profit in Tortola—all her sails luted but her foremast, which appeared to be mostly blown out of the bolt ropes, and from every appearance all hands must have perished. Her flour sold at 13 dollars.

The Natchez Gazette of the 22th September, mentions the arrival there of Col. Thomas Butler, from Tennessee; and that he left town the next day, to take command of the troops of the United States in Louisiana.

Captain Pettyplace, arrived at Boston, from the Isle of France, has communicated the following information:—"The America and Print from Batavia, stepped at the Isle of France and brought accounts that there was not a pound of coffee, nor sugar, to be had there—the company magazines were completely emptied, and several American ships had left there in search of return cargoes—the Print had no Coffee on board, and the sugar which the America had on board was purchased of captain Field, of Salem, at 1 1/2 dollars advance, per picul. In consequence of this news, Coffee rose at the Isle of France, from 16 to 17 1/2 dollars per cwt. and was very scarce even at that price.—Markets very bad for Flour, Beef, Pork, Brandy, Gin, and all kinds of provisions.

By the arrival of the ship John Morgan, captain Howard, from Bordeaux, we have received PARIS PAPERS to the 6th of September—and when we inform the reader, that the following are the most interesting articles in them, he will be convinced that they are truly barren.

As to the invasion, nothing is stated in the French papers; and we are verbally informed, that, though the preparations are still going on, yet this long-threatened event appears to be as distant as ever.

His Imperial Majesty was expected to be at A x la Chapelle on the 3d of September, where many of the high officers of State, and foreigners of distinction had already arrived.

PARIS, September 4.—The minister of the interior has made known, by letter of the 5th Fructidor, that his Imperial Majesty has ordered him to take without delay the necessary measures for suspending the exportation of grain from all the departments where it had been permitted by the imperial decree of the 25th Prairial last. Accordingly all exportation of grain & flour is provisionally prohibited without exception or modification.

September 5.—The Pope will leave Rome for Paris, it is said, on the 26th September. According to letters from Leghorn, an embargo has been laid on all Russian and Swedish shipping in the Ports of Italy. This news wants confirmation.

Copenhagen, August 19.—Mr. Bohm, Russian Rear Admiral, has just entered our harbor with three ships of the line, a frigate and two cutters. After having taken in fresh provisions, he is to continue his route.

Our government has assented to the formation of a volunteer militia for the defence of the coast. 3456 men are already enlisted for that body, which is to form a cordon at the distance of 2 miles from the shore.

Hamburgh, August 27.—It appears certain, that the sailing of the Russian squadron had no other object, than to exercise the seamen. Not only as it is said, that it will not be augmented, but that it has received order to return by the latter end of September. Six ships of this squadron were on the 25th inst.

in the road of Copenhagen, under the orders of Rear Admiral's Crowns and Bohman; three of them were to sail for the North Sea; Admiral Ischit-chagow is commander in chief of the squadron. From the 12th to the 18th of August, 351 vessels have passed through the sound.

STATE PAPERS. Relative to the new assumption of title by his IMPERIAL MAJESTY FRANCIS II. Emperor of Germany.

VIENNA, August 15. His Royal, Imperial, Apostolic Majesty arrived in this city on the 10th inst. from Baden, to assist at an extraordinary conference of state, at which were present his royal highness the archduke Palatine of Hungary, the chancellor of Hungary, that of Bohemia and Austria that of Transylvania, the Tavernicus of Hungary, and the President of the chamber of Finances and of the Bank. In consequence of the supreme determination which has been declared in this council of state the following Patent is published:—

PATENT. We FRANCIS II. by the grace of God elected Emperor of the Romans, always August, King of Germany, of Hungary, and Bohemia, of Galicia, Lodomeria, &c. Archduke of Austria, Duke of Burgundy and Lorraine, grand duke of Tuscany, &c. &c.

"Though we have already attained by the Divine will, and by the choice of the electors of the Roman and Germanic empire, to a dignity which leaves no room to desire any augmentation of titles and consideration, it is, however, our duty, in our quality of chief of the Austrian house and monarchy, to provide for the maintenance and preservation of that equality of hereditary titles and dignities with the first sovereigns and powers of Europe, which belongs to the sovereignty of Austria, both on account of the ancient lustre of their house, and in regard to the extent and population of their estates, comprehending independent kingdoms and principalities, so considerable, and which have been secured to them by possession, agreeably to the right of nations, and by treaties.—To establish, in a durable manner, this perfect equality of rank, we have determined and think ourselves authorized, after the example which has been given us in the preceding century by the imperial court of Russia, and that which is now given to us by the new sovereign of France, to confer also on the house of Austria, as far as relates to its independent states, the hereditary title EMPEROR. We have therefore resolved, after mature reflection, solemnly to assume and to establish, for us and for our successors, in the unalterable possession of our independent kingdoms and states, the title and dignity of HEREDITARY EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA (as the denomination of our house, in such a manner that all our kingdoms, principalities, and provinces shall invariably retain the titles, constitutions prerogatives, and relations which they have hitherto enjoyed.

According to this supreme decision and declaration, we decree and enact:—

I. That immediately after our title of Elected emperor of the Romans, shall be inserted that of Hereditary Emperor of Austria, after which shall follow our other titles of King of Germany, Bohemia, Hungary, &c.—then those of archduke of Austria, Duke of Styria, &c. and those of the other hereditary countries. But as since our accession to the throne, there have successively taken place, in the possessions of our house, several changes, which have been confirmed by solemn treaties, we at the same time make known the undermentioned titles, newly regulated, according to the present state of things, and our will is, that they be introduced and employed in future.

The title of imperial Prince and of Imperial Princess, shall be given and conferred with that of Archduke and archduchess, as well as royal highness, to our descendants of both sexes, and to those of our successors in the sovereignty of the house of Austria.

III. As all our kingdoms and other possessions must retain, without restriction, their present denominations and relations, this is understood in particular of our kingdom of Hungary, and of the countries which are united to it, and also of such of our hereditary States as have hitherto been in immediate relation with the Germanic empire, which ought in future to preserve the same relations with it agreeably to the privileges granted to our house by the Emperors, our predecessors.

IV. We reserve to ourselves the right of determining hereafter the solemnities which shall take place at our coronation and that of our successors as Hereditary Emperor. Those however which were practised at our coronation, and at that of our predecessors, as king of Hungary and Bohemia, shall continue to subsist in future without any change.

V. This Declaration and ordinance shall be published and carried into execution throughout all our hereditary kingdoms and states, without delay, and in the accustomed forms. We have no doubt that all our states and subjects will receive, with gratitude and patriotic interest this disposition, the object of which is to maintain the consideration of the Austrian Monarchy.

Done at Vienna, the 11th of August, 1804.

RATISBON, August 27. On the day before yesterday, the following Note was delivered in to the Protocol of the Diet, accompanied by a letter from the Envoy of the Emperor and King, to which was annexed the Imperial Patent.

NOTE.

"The Royal and Electoral Bohemian, and Archducal Austrian Legations, have received from their Sovereign, the annexed pragmatic ordinance, by virtue of which his Imperial Royal Majesty, as ruler of the Austrian Monarchy, has resolved, pursuant to the example of France, and from the motives therein stated, to assume the hereditary Imperial title.

"The undersigned Legations do not fail to inform the General assembly of the Empire thereof; and whereas his Majesty has already issued special Letters of notification to all his Co-estates of the Empire, he doubts not but they will be received in the most friendly view.

"As by this new hereditary dignity no alteration is made in the relations in which the German Hereditary States stood to the Roman Empire, conformably to the express tenor of the pragmatic ordinance; the undersigned Royal, Electoral Bohemian and Archducal Austrian Legations, have received express orders, precisely to declare, that no alteration is thereby intended in the other political relations and references; but, on the contrary, that his Majesty will take a double consideration, invariably to continue the friendly, candid, and benevolent sentiments which he has hitherto endeavored to show to all his co-estates.

(Signed) Frederick Count Stadion, Egidius Joseph Charles Von Fahrenberg."

"Ratisbon, August 24, 1804."

This day the following Note was communicated on the part of Sweden:—

NOTE.

"Pursuant to the note received by the general assembly of the empire on the 25th inst. from the illustrious Electoral, Bohemian, and Archducal Austrian Legations, relative to the Austrian Imperial title, the present loyal and dutiful legation finds itself induced to declare: That whereas his majesty the king of Sweden certainly takes a sincere part in any communication tending to the benefit and satisfaction of his majesty, the Roman Emperor, and his august imperial house; nevertheless, his royal majesty, as well in his quality as a guarantee of the constitution of the empire, as also particularly as a state of the empire, conceives the object proposed to stand in such an inseparable connection with the composition of the German empire itself, that the same had better be laid before the assembly of the empire, not merely as a notice, but as a point for discussion, that all the members may have an opportunity of expressing their ideas founded upon the constitution.

VIENNA, August 18. The following note has been transmitted by the Vice Court and State Chancellor to the Corps Diplomatic at Vienna:

His imperial majesty has commanded the undersigned Vice Court and State Chancellor to notify to M——, that his majesty has been pleased to assume the dignity of hereditary emperor of Austria, and to cause himself to be proclaimed as such.

M—— is requested to communicate this to his court. The emperor hopes that this communication will be received in a manner perfectly agreeable to the connection which so happily exists between the two sovereigns, and that the object of the same will be considered as adapted to public circumstances. Induced by these to assume the imperial dignity, his majesty is at the same time convinced that this resolution cannot in any manner be detrimental to the relation in which he stands to the German empire, and the different countries which compose the Austrian monarchy.

The undersigned assures M—— of his most particular esteem.

His imperial majesty has appointed a grand council of state to be held on the 21st inst. under the presidency of the principal Chamberlain, the Prince of Stahrenberg, and attended by the principal Court Chancellor, and other officers of the court, in which the ceremonial of the coronation & the festivities on the occasion will be arranged.
