It is not at all improbable, that captain Bradley's insolence and insult upon our laws in the waters of New York, may obtain him a similar promotion, upon his removal to Europe.

From E-glish policy any more than English ships of war, it is fruitless to expect any thing like justice—we must do justice to ourselves, by a non imporsation agreement or by such heavy duries on their goods; as will make the British merchants who live by American coinmerce our negociators-and we trust congress will, at the appreaching cession begin this good and necessary work.
