ANNAPOLIS, Nov. 8, 1864.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

TUESDAY, November 6, 1864.

Monday the 5th inst. being the day appointed by the constitution and form of government for the meeting of the legislature of this state...

The house appointed Mr. Cornlius Mills sergeant at arms, Mr. John Trueman, door-keeper, and Mr. John Sands assistant door-keeper.

On motion, ordered that Mr. Muir inform the reverend Mr. Wyatt, that the house requires he will perform Divine service very morning at the meeting of the house.

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Stansbury and Mr. Scott wait on his Excellency the Governor, and inform him, that the house is ready to receive any communications he may think proper to make.

The house adjourned till to-morrow morning.

The election for electors will be held to-day throughout this state. And we are sorry to add, that such arrangements have not been made by the opposing candidates...
