The schooner Eliza Vickers, Vickery, was left at New Orleans on the 8th October.

A gentleman from the lower end of the town informs that, being led by curiosity, he yesterday afternoon visited the Howard street market, as it is called, and that, to his surprise, he counted around the market-house, the number of 76 waggons, besides carts—Flesh, of all kinds was plenty, vegetables and roots in considerable abundance—good butter at 25 cents the lb.

A number of fair faces were witnessed about the market place; and the whole appears to portend the future advancement of that quarter of the city in wealth and convenience.

On Monday afternoon, between the Philadelphia road and Smith's rope walk, a new born infant was found by some children, decently enclosed in a coffin and slightly interred. The coroner was acquainted with the circumstance to summon a jury of inquest.

2. A letter from the Marquis Casa Yrujo, accompanying the foregoing communication.
3. A proclamation of the president U. S. determining fort Stoddert to be the port of entry in the district of Mobile, in Eastern Louisiana.
4. A report concerning the lead mines in Louisiana.

Of these, with the other interesting papers, on the state of our finances, &c. we are promised copies, which shall be laid before our readers with as little delay as possible.

SHIP NEWS

PORT OF BALTIMORE.

The Fame, Davis, hence was at New Orleans on the 12th ult. The schooner Prosperity, Gray, was left at Point Peire, the beginning of October last, to sail in 10 days for Baltimore, if not sold.

November 12. Arrived yesterday, ship Chesapeake Lee, 46 days from the Cordovan. Left the City of Bordeaux the 6th September but was detained in the river for want of water. Left at Bordeaux, September 20, ship Stafford, Chaytor, of Baltimore, ready to sail for do; Union, Merrilow, of and for Baltimore; loading; Dolphin, Hal, of and for Charleston; loading; Mercury, Donald, of do uncertain; H. B. Trist, Ricker, of and for New Orleans; loading; Governor Claiborne, Harris, of and for do ready to sail; Thomas J. Jackson, Hill, of New Orleans, loading for do; Ulysses, Simmonds, of do, do, do; Pomona, D. L. Latham, of New York, do, do, do; Eugenia, Frary, of do, do, do; Joseph and P. Peck, of Boston, loading for New York; Suffolk, Ingraham, of Boston, repairing; Fanny, Philip, of do, loading for do; brig Rola, Hand, of New York, do, do; Adventure, Sewell, of do, do; Speedwell, George, of Newburyport, loading; Industry, Cook, of Salem, do; Jan. Jones, of Philadelphia, loading for do; Daniel and Frederick, Webb, of Charleston, unloading; sch's Five Brothers, Baker, of Boston, loading for New Orleans; Gen'l J. Hudson, Lewis, of Boston, loading for do; Jefferson, Hall, of do, unloading; and several others, names not recollected. September 19, spoke going up the river, ship Independence, McConnell, of and from Baltimore—Also, saw ship London Packet, of Baltimore. Spoke same day, ship Bordeaux Packet, of and from Philadelphia, last from Portsmouth, Eng. having been captured. September 20, spoke going in the river, ship George Washington, of New Orleans, from London, and Sarah, of do. 25th, spoke sch Orion, of Philadelphia, from Rochelle, in the river. Saved in company with Sally, Hunt, of and for Philadelphia; brig Minerva, Travis, of and for New York; sch'r Safflower, Crocker, of Boston, for Philadelphia. November 2, in lat 35, N. long. 60, W. spoke sch'r Dolphin, of Portsmouth, N. H. from Boston bound to Matinico, out 8 days.

Came passengers in the Chesapeake, Monsieur Carts and Lada, Monsieur Proger, La Carce, and Mademoiselle Faudoas.

Extracts from the log book of the schooner Lauring, John M. Icer, from Jamaica, arrived at Savannah. Friday, September 14—at 7 o'clock A. M. brought to and boarded by his Britannic majesty's ship Fortune, captain Vanseiter, and treated politely. Friday, September 21—at 6 o'clock P. M. boarded by his Britannic majesty's schooner Flying Fish, lieutenant Price who impressed two of our men, and used very abusive language, after detaining the men some time—strong representation being made, they were returned on board. Sunday, September 30—at 8 o'clock A. M. Cape Corientes, bearing N. W. distance three leagues, brought to and boarded by a French privateer and treated politely, supplied us with two bags of bread, being all the provisions they could spare, for which no payment would be accepted, although repeatedly offered—the officers were much exasperated (and seemed determined of retaliation) against all Baltimore vessels, owing to a brig belonging to and bound thence, having put five Frenchmen on an uninhabited shore, with a few biscuits and a little water—they also begged to be formed if the Baltimore convoy from S. Domingo bound home, had sailed. The privateer had in company the British ship Telemachus, from the Bay of Honduras bound to London—cargo mahogany, logwood, &c. taken a few days before, and which they offered us for 5000 dollars; the officers and crew were put on board American vessels, ports of destination unknown. At 6 o'clock P. M. Cape Antonio, bearing N. N. W. distance from three to four leagues, discovered a French privateer, consort to the above, with another British ship, a prize, lying at anchor, close under the Cape—we understood from the one who boarded us that she was bound from Cam. each to England—cargo nor name not known—she was a large ship, black sides, no head nor galleries. Perceiving the privateer getting ready for chase, we bore up under the appearance of intending to speak her—but night coming on, conceived it most prudent to wave a second overhauling, stood off to the westward. At half past seven fired a shot ahead, but did not cause us to alter our course.

Monday, October 6—at 10 o'clock A. M. Bomini Isles bearing N. N. E. distance three leagues, discovered a large ship on the rocks, and three small vessels at anchor: Our being very short of provisions and water, caused us to bear up in order to procure a supply—at 3 o'clock P. M. came to anchor, when the following gentlemen came on board: captain Peter Mott, of schooner Joseph; James Mott,

of sloop Resolution; and Nathaniel Sweeting, of sloop Lively—all of Providence; whose polite attention and friendly assistance, demands our grateful acknowledgments, and from whom we received one barrel beef, one cask water, a quantity of sugar, fresh fish, &c. for which, no payment nor any return whatever, would be accepted of—and seemed sorry they had it not in their power to render us further service; they informed us the ship on shore was from Havana, bound to Terra Firma—cargo sugar, wrecked in the hurricane of the 6th, 7th and 8th September, and four of the crew perished. The schooner Jane, captain Kerrison, of this port, put in to Havana, on Saturday, 29th September, 27 days from Kingston, with the loss of her mainmast, the top of her foremast and rigging much damaged—A few days wanting water, casks being stove in the perpetual gales she encountered.

Put into Port Royal, his Britannic majesty's ships Theseus and Le Hucane, of 74, a double of 44 guns; the former obliged to throw all her guns overboard, and rendered incapable of further service—the latter two damaged, and otherwise much damaged. The British packet arrived at Kingston, in lat. 33, long. 75, came through the Red for Great Britain, consisting of 174 sail, which left Jamaica the 9th June, under convoy of his Majesty's ships Bellerophon, Diadem and two frigates. Philadelphia, November 11. Arrived, brig Hiram, Taber, New Orleans; Jefferson, Dean, St. Pierre; Neptune, Small, St. Croix; Globe, Williams, Surinam; Sally, Brown, St. Pierre; Lydia, Webb, Charleston; sch'r Beaver, G. de, Cape Francois; Enterprise, Lewis, Alexandria. Cleared, brig Experiment, Becke, Savannah; sloop Patty, Newton, Alexandria.

Saturday arrived here, the brig Cicero, Williams from Surinam. Left there, 8th October, ship Alexander Hamilton, R. de, just arrived in 63 days from New York; brig Harriet, from Norfolk, arrived October 7; schooner Topsham Beauty, Sores, to sail in a few days; sch'r Eliza, of Alexandria; schooner Betsy Caleb, of Boston, from Amsterdam, but lost from Gibraltar being ordered away from thence. On the 14th of October, in lat. 12, 54 long. 56, 10, spoke sch'r Charlotte from Boston, for Barbice, out 38 days; the next day spoke the schooner Betsy, from New York, bound to Barbados, out 41 days.—October 20, lat 25 47, long 67, spoke sch'r Mercury, from Surinam, to Norfolk, out 20 days. October 29, lat. 33, long. 72 30, spoke sch'r Friendship, from Baltimore, for St. Jago on 3 days and on the 4th, in lat. 37 40 long. 74, spoke sch'r Federal, from Surinam, for Rhode Island, out 50 days.

Also, brig Hiram, captain Talbot, from New Orleans, which he left the 8th, and the Balize at the mouth of the Mississippi, the 10th, and left us, that he left the following vessels at New Orleans. Ships Ocean, Harrison, of New Orleans leading for Bordeaux; Palau, Marshall, of New York for Bordeaux, to sail in 3 or 4 days; Palmira, Remington, Providence, loading for Liverpool; Thomas, Wilson, Commodore of Philadelphia, loading for Liverpool—Brig Hope, of New York, waiting for freight, O. de, R. de, loading for New York and sch'r Eliza Vickers, Vickery, of Baltimore. In coming down the Mississippi he spoke the sch'r Lucy, Martin, then 7 miles from the tow, bound up, in distress—Saw also the English turn, ship Fame, Davis, of Baltimore, bound up. Two miles above the S. S. W. pass, saw where in distress, the brig Lydia, of Washington. (N. C.) At the Balize, he saw the sch'r Hunter's Delight, of Barbice, in distress, having cut away her mast; on the outside of the Balize, he saw a brig from New York, bearing in, but could not learn her name.

The ship Louisiana, Ingersoll, from New York; the brig Tern, Fruns, of New York, for Liverpool, and the brig Jason, Palmer, of Philadelphia, for Liverpool, all left the Balize on the 9th of October.

The schooner William, is seized by the Custom house at New Orleans. Yesterday, the Lydia, Webb in 5 days from Charleston; the sch'r Wealthy, Foster, sailed for this port the day before—Captain W saw her off the Fryng Pan shoals. The sch'r Three Sisters, Hall, had put into Charleston in distress, on her passage from New York to George Town, S. C.

Captain Talbot, of the Hiram, on the 13th of October, spoke sch'r Sukey and Polly, Smith, from this port for New Orleans, out 29 days. On the 30th ult. spoke sch'r Nancy, Bruce, of and for Boston from Havana, out 15 days, and the same day spoke the sch'r Federal, from Surinam for New York, out 28 days. On the 4th inst. 25 leagues to the southward of Cape Henlopen, spoke the brig Two Friends, Martins, from New Orleans to this port.
