The fame\_advantages secure it against bombardment, for there are very tery politions in which a bomb ketch could be placed, so as to enable her to throw her thelts with the certainty of their reaching the harbor. The attempt made during the last war by Lord Nelson to bombard, was afterwards discovered to have completely miscarried. Of the vast number of thells which were thrown during a cannonade of many hours, it was subtequently afcertained that not above two of them fell in the harbor, and very few reached the lower town.

The harbour of Calais is protected by no fuch advantages. There are no heights in the vicinity of that town which give a great command and range of fire, and the single experiment which has been already made this war, has proved that there is no part of that town or harbour which may not be essetually assailed by bomb vessels.
