From ANNAPOLIS, Nov. 20.  
This day the senate formed a quorum, and proceeded to elect the governor and council, and on counting the ballots, Robert Bowie, esq. had a majority and was declared governor, and according to the constitution qualified—and on counting the ballots for the council, it appeared that R. Ghelein, R. T. Earl, A. B. Duckett, Digges, and Richard Hall Harwood, esquires, elected council, the last named gentleman being president. On the governor's being declared, a salute of 17 guns was fired from captain Muir's artillery, which was answered by the French frigate La President, now lying opposite our harbor. [Fed. Gaz.]

There were 210 republican votes, and 1275 Anti left taken in the above towns this election, than there were in August. In August last the same towns gave the Anti-republicans a majority of 729—which makes a republican gain, since that period, of 1065.

## WAR WITH TRIPOLI.

We are happy to be able to announce the favorable commencement of active operations against the Bey of Tripoli's towns and shipping. By an arrival at this port in 49 days from Leghorn, advices are received that, the town of Tripoli had been twice bombarded by commodore Preble, with much injury to the barbarians, and with little loss to the American squadron.

A third attack was meditated. The success attending the enterprize encourages the hope that hostilities will be speedily terminated with honor to the United States.

The following letters, on the subject are copied from major Jackson's paper of last evening—on this occasion we cannot forbear calling the reader's attention to the late structures of the major, on the state of our affairs in the Mediterranean—what does he now say? Not a sentence in praise of the administration, because

success is announced—had disaster attended our squadron, the administration would have been immediately denounced by the major and the other federal under-lingers. [Aurora.]

Extract from a letter to a respectable merchant in this city, dated  
LEGHORN, Sept. 23, 1804.

DEAR SIR—  
"I wrote to you in July, by Mr. Donovan, of Philadelphia, and give you a short account of our prospects relative to the war with Tripoli. Commodore Preble's conduct since has been extremely judicious—the annexed extract will inform you of the consequences which have already attended his exertions, and will tend to prove that the measures which I have so strenuously recommended to government, were founded upon a probability of success; in my next I hope to be enabled to inform you of an advantageous peace having taken place at the expense of the Ballaw's pride."

Extract of a letter from Mr. Higgins, at Malta, to J. L. Cathcart, dated  
MALTA, Sept. 5th, 1804.

DEAR SIR—  
"I am in receipt of late letters from commodore Preble off Tripoli; he had then made two attacks upon the barbarians, the first by day, he took three of their gun boats, the second by night he sunk three more, and a large Polucca, he has I presume ere this made another assault, the result of which I am hourly expecting to learn. The reinforcement from America has not yet arrived—if they do arrive in time to form a junction with the force under the command of commodore Preble, before the bad weather commences, I do think the Ballaw will accede to any terms that may be proposed to him, he has already come down very considerably in his demands, relinquishing entirely I believe, his hopes of future tribute."

"Orders of the Prefect of Guadaloupe.  
"It is forbidden to all American captains, under the penalty of 200 dollars, to introduce into this colony any newspapers, gazettes or proclamations from any part of the world whatsoever; and if they have any on board, they may and must deposit them at the captain of the port's office.  
Done at Bassaterre, (G.) the 5th Vendemiaire, 5th year of the French Republic.

## Mediterranean Passports.

Notice is hereby given, that it has been deemed expedient to change the form of the Mediterranean Passport is sued to vessels of the United States; that from the eighth day of July next; those of the new form will be issued at the custom houses to every vessel, for which application may be made on a compliance with the terms prescribed by law and surrendering the former passport of which she may be possessed, if any, in which latter case no fees will be required for the exchange; and that by an arrangement agreed upon by the Barbary powers, with whom we are at peace, either the old or the new form of passport will be sufficient to protect the vessels of the United States, from capture until the 1st of July 1805, after which the old form of passport will be unavailable and the new one alone in use.
