**PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND. HOUSE OF DELEGATES.**

MONDAY, November 19, 1804. The house met pursuant to adjournment.

A petition from the Chesapeake insurance company, a petition from John M'Kim, and others of the city of Baltimore, and a petition from John Norris, of John, of Harford county, were read and referred.

Leave given to bring in a supplement to the act to establish and regulate a market at Bridge town, in Kent county, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

Ordered. That Mr. Chapman and Mr. Parnham be added to the committee appointed to bring in a further supplement to the act relating to negroes, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned.

Mr. Luke W. Barber, a delegate from St. Mary's county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.

Leave given to bring in a bill authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of improving the navigation of Corlica creek, in Queen-Anne's county.

Leave given to bring in a bill to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the name of The Farmer's Bank of Maryland, and for other purposes.

Mr. Bond, from the committee on the petition of John Norris, delivered a report, in his favour; which was read.

Mr. Ringgold delivered a bill, entitled "An act authorizing Jacob Schnebely late sheriff and collector of Washington county, to complete his collection; which was read.

Petitions from William Stevens, of Talbot county, and Jonathan Breedy of Queen-Anne's county, praying acts of insolvency, were read and referred.

Adjourned till to-morrow morning, 9 o'clock.

TUESDAY, November 20.

THE house met pursuant to adjournment. Mr. Daniel Sheredin, a delegate from Cecil county, appeared, qualified, and took his seat.

Petitions from Jacob Fowble, Fordom Pease Francis W. Boligian, Samuel Walker and Michael Baroux, of the city of Baltimore, and James Chappalear, of St. Mary's county, praying acts of insolvency, were read and referred.

A petition from Lemuel Ennis, of Worcester county, and a petition from John Sterett, and others, of Cecil county, were read and referred.

The report on the petition of John Norris, of John, was read the second time, and the resolution therein assented to.

The clerk of the senate delivered the bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council, passed by that house; which was ordered to be engrossed.

Adjourned till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

[As little business by a view of the proceedings appears to have been done this day, it may be necessary to state that much time was necessarily consumed in electing and qualifying the governor and council, whose elections have been previously announced.]

WEDNESDAY, November 21, 1804

The house met pursuant to adjournment.

Mr. Thomas Bayly and Mr. John Cottman, delegates from Somerset county, and Mr. Josiah Bayly, a delegate from Dorchester county, appeared, qualified, and took their seats.

A petition from Zadock Holston, of Worcester county, was read and referred.

Petitions from Henry Child, Howell Price, Walter S. Hunt and Anthony Lamerlere, of the city of Baltimore, and Joshua Stevenfon, of Frederick county, for acts of insolvency, were read and referred.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Kent and Queen-Anne's counties, was read and referred.

The bill to authorize Jacob Schnebely, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, to complete his collection, was passed and sent to the senate.

A petition, from the sheriffs of sundry counties was read and referred.

Ordered. That the communications from the executive be referred to the senate.

Resolved. That the house will immediately proceed to elect, by ballot a treasurer for the western shore, to hold the said office agreeably to the constitution, and the person having the majority of votes of the attending members shall be declared duly elected.

The house proceeded to ballot for a treasurer, and on examination it appeared that Benjamin Harwood had a majority of votes; he was accordingly declared to be the treasurer of the western shore. The additional supplement to the act entitled, "An act respecting the settlers on the reserved lands westward of Fort Cumberland," was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Stephen delivered a bill, entitled, "An act to separate Rogers's Addition to Baltimore-town from the city of Baltimore, and to make it a part of Baltimore county;" which was read.

The bill for the relief of John D. Coffey, of Montgomery county was read the second time and passed.

The report on the petition of Richard Watts was read the second time, and the resolution therein assented to.

A petition from Thomas Burk, of Frederick county, was read and referred.

Leave was given to bring in a further additional supplement to the act for the relief of the poor of Calvert county.

A petition from William Dubourg, and others, was read and referred.

Mr. Stephen delivered a bill, entitled, "An act respecting the religious sect of people called Jews;" which was read.

Mr. Ellicott delivered a bill, entitled, "A supplement to an act, entitled, An act authorizing the city commissioners to open and extend Water-street in the city of Baltimore;" which was read.

Mr. Lowry delivered a bill, entitled, "An act authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money for improving the navigation of Corlica creek, in Queen-Anne's county;" which was read.

A petition from Nathan Offutt, of Edward, of Montgomery county, was read and referred.

Adjourned till to-morrow morning, 9 o'clock.

Electors for Senators have already been held by New Jersey and Rhode Island. Mr. Dayton has been succeeded as senator, for the former State, by Mr. Aaron Kitchell, whose six years will commence on 4th March next, and expire on 3d March, 1811. Mr. Ellery will be succeeded, as senator from the latter state, by Mr. James Fenner, whose term will likewise commence on the 4th March next, and expire on the 3d March, 1811.

Who are to succeed to the remaining nine vacancies, of the first class, we have not yet heard, but it is believed they will all be re-elected.

Of those senators that go out with the present session four are anti-republicans, instead of one of whom a republican has already been chosen. Of those that will remain after this session for only will be anti-republicans;—should Mr. Bayard be chosen there will then be six; and if Messrs. Olcott and Pickering should be re-elected, there will be at the utmost but eight federalists of thirty-four members of the senate; of the nine congress.

GENERAL TURREAU, Grand officer of the Legion of Honor, appointed Minister Plenipotentiary of his Majesty the Emperor of the French, to the United

States, was on the 23d inst. received in that character by the President.

General Turreau was accompanied by captain Marin, his first aid-de-camp. We understand that Madame Turreau and family are daily expected in a vessel that was to sail shortly after the general's departure, attended by Mr. Pety, first secretary, and Mr. de Cabre, second secretary of legation.
