So it was resolved in the affirmative.
It was then ordered that a committee of seven be balloted for to prepare and bring in the same, and Messrs. Montgomery, Stephen, Scott, Clarke, Somerville, Williams and Ringgold were duly elected.

The ship Bald Eagle, captain Langdon, bound to this port, (whole arrival in Hampton Roads was mentioned in our paper of yesterday) has nearly 300 passengers. The pilot went down to her last evening (says the Norfolk Herald of the 24th) returned last evening; and we are happy to learn that their situation is not so deplorable as imagined, upwards of 30 have died, the captain and mate have been sick, but are quite recovered, and the whole are now in good health. The vessel has lost her rudder, main-top-mast, and almost all her sails, her stern is also much shattered.

By the schooner Friendship, arrived at Philadelphia, in 15 days from New-Province, we have received the "Royal Gazette and Bahama Advertiser," from which we have selected the following articles:—

Nassau, (N. P.) November 9.
Arrived, brig Union, Pinder, Charleston; sch'r Cynthia, Albury, New York; sloop Maria, Yellowly, do.
Cleared, sloop Enterprise, Johnson, New York.
Ship John, captain Willy, of London, sailed from Portsmouth the 8th of March, for the Isles de Lofs; arrived there on the 8th of April, and took in 172 slaves. Sailed from thence the 2d of October, and arrived here on the 8th inst. without losing out of the crew or cargo.
The ship John, Moore, in 26 days from Liverpool and Madeira, left Madeira the 13th of October, was boarded by her majesty's sloop of war Nimrod, on her passage to Madeira, and by the Raccoon, who pressed three of her men, on her passage to this port. The Raccoon was bound to join a naval armament intended for the reduction of Carracoa.
Captain Willy informs, that the ship Eagle, of London, captain M'Gee, was captured by two French privateers, and that two other ships were also captured on the River Gambia.
Ship Anna Maria, Jones, captain Copeland, belonging to Edenton, N. C. (with a cargo of salt, from Long Island,

bound to New York, sprung a leak on Monday night, and put in here yesterday in distress.

DISASTERS.—Captain Ranfon, of the Schooner Mars, belonging to Washington, North Carolina, arrived here on Friday from Abaco. The captain informs, that his vessel struck on Abacco on the 29th ult. The crew and greatest part of the cargo saved, some of which arrived here on Friday in the Good Intent, captain Low, who treated captain Ranfon with distinguished attention.
The brig Samuel, captain Cantwell, of Baltimore, from thence to St. Domingo, was cast away at the same time and place. The captain, supercargo and crew except one man named John Craig, were lost, part of the cargo is saved.
We will always be happy in noting acts of humanity to the unfortunate. But when villainy and inhumanity are referred to, it will always be noticed. We are credibly informed, that some fellows settled in one of the Abacco Keys, not only stole what they could lay their hands on, but threatened the life of the only man saved from the brig Samuel. When they act honestly they are liberally rewarded for time and labor, when this is considered, their conduct must appear highly censurable.

A subscription has been opened, and to the credit of the inhabitants of Nassau, generally subscribed to, for the relief of the crew of the brig Flora, of Philadelphia, taken off the wreck by captain Burton of the snow Thames.
We have been favored by captain Deagle, with the Norfolk Herald of the 24th inst. and an interesting memorandum, in manuscript, from its editors, as follows: [Fed Gaz.]
"The schooner Seventy Six, captain Wills, 37 days from Teneriff, informs, that there has been an earthquake at Cadiz, which has done considerable damage. The islands of Majorca and Minorca have revolted against the Spanish government, and declared that they consider themselves no longer under the same. At Malaga the fever raged with such violence, that the king of Spain thought it prudent to send a force by sea and land to blockade the place, to prevent the spreading the contagion. The inhabitants rose against the troops and defeated them; the consequence was, that the greater part of the inhabitants fled from Malaga into the interior.
"The above is confirmed by two other arrivals in Hampton Roads—bound to the northward from Lisbon, but put in thro' bad winds."
