That on satisfactory evidence or information being given to the collector of an port that any vessel within the same is armed or arming or provided with the me ns of being armed at fea. for the purpose of committing, any unlawful act as herein before expressed, or of carrying on by force of arms, any unlawful commerce. shall be the duty of such collector to detain such vessel until the case be submitted to the president of the United States who is hereby authorised to cause such a vessel to be disarmed or a clearance to be granted as he shall judge proper.


