sequent abolition of the high court of errors ind appeals. While these improvements are, wanting it is unjuit to afcribe to any other cause the embarrassment or the clamor of fuitors, the delay or the oppression of the laws.

Of the conduct of the militia it would be ungrateful to speak in any terms but those of respect and praise. Exertions more spirited and esficient could not be displayed by individuals aware of the importance of their services, and anxious to merit the confidence of their country. am persuaded, indeed, that with an adequate pecu iary aid from the public treafury to furnish the necessary equipments and implements of war, Pennlylvania will be ready, on every emergency, to support the flandard of the union with her full quota of armed and disciplined fréemen will only add on this subject, that it rests with you to comply with the requilitions of the act of Congress, passed the second day of March, 1803.

The act for the inspection of butter exported from the river Delaware is now in successful operation, permit me to surgest the propriety of subjecting lard to the like inspection and of extending the law to the river Ohio.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives.

The proper officers have been directed to exhibit to the legislature an elimate of the expences that will be incurred in the course of the current year to maintain the government, and to meet the public engagements; particularly in relation to the compromise with the l'ennsylvania patentees of land in the leventeen townships of Luzerne county: and I am happy to inform you, that, from a comparative view of those expences, with the product of our present revenues, it will appear that no auxiliary fund will be necessary.

Gentlemen of the senate and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

In manisesting the grat tude we feel for the prosperous condition of our public alfairs, nothing can be more acceptable to DIVINE PROVIDENCE; hothing more beneficial to our country; nothing more honorable to ourtelves, than the cultivation of our " peace on eart. and good will towards men." In the complete possession of civil and religious liberty as a community, and entitled to qual righ s of opinion and of action as individuale. we can only endanger or impair the enjoyments of such advantages by indulging petty jealousies dissentions and seuds. At this period of republican triumph and sple: do:, a rational mind can hardly indeed conceive a mot ve for discontent or animosity; though it trembles at the probable consequences of distrus: and disuni on (by whatever cruse produced) among the genuine friends of American indepen dence. Elevated how ver Gentlemen, as you are, by popular confidence, to a stati on of high trust and responsibility, our fellow citizens justly hope, from your wisdom, not only a faithful performance of the ordinary t ik of legislation, bu a warental infiuence to inculcate, by precept and example, t e principles of mutual de ference and respect; so that social and p: litical concord may be permanen'ly establithed upon the basis of a commo interest. In this and in every other work that you sha!l undertake for the public good, be assured of my respectful and zea-Iou co-operation.

WASHINGTON, December 7. We have been favored with the following extracts of letters, received from refpeclable sources, relating to the appearance of a New Prophet in the kingdom of-Algiers.

Algiers, June 27. This day the Dey [of Algiers] sent out two schooners and two gun boats, to search for a Moor, who styles himself a Marabout, or Holy man, who has collected a number of persons about Bona to join him, and has taken fifty four Frenchmen. who were filling for coral near (alle, and carried them into captivity. He is dec'ared a rebel by the Dey, and the French commissary general here has made a strong remonstrance and demanded the men of the Dey.

Algiers July 16. A report prevails that the Marabout, who had taken the Frenchmen [at ionstantin] ad compelled them to become Mahomedans, and that he had attacked the city of Constantin with 30,000 Carbiles, but had been repulled with great loss; and that the Dey had sent in cash 10,000 marboors to Contlantin, and a promise to relieve the country from taxes for four years.

Tunis, August 7. The new prophet has occasioned much disorder in different parts of Algiers; he made but a short slay at Constantin; but perfectly stripped, that place; taking with him arms, ammunition, cloathing; horses and a vast nummer of cattle ; retiring again to the mountains -I learn that his a my at this moment consills of one hundred and eighty thousand men, and is daily increaling; all communication between this and Algiers is flopped.


