DECEMBER 7, 1804. Mr. Pickering laid on the table the following- motion, which was read, and ordered to lie for contideration.

RESOLVED, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, Two thirds of both Houses concurring, that the following article be proposed to the legislatures of the several states, as an amendment to the constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the said constitution.

ARTICLE

From and after the third of March, one thousand eight hundred and nine, representatives and direct taxes, shall be apportioned among the feveral flates, which may be included within this union, according to the numbers of their free inhabitants, respectively.


