He wished the bill to be rendered as efficacious as possible, and in order to remove the objection raised by doubts as to the constitutionality on account of calling forth the militia, he was willing to strike that part from the bill.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 14.

Mr. Stewart brought up the petition of Captain Thomas Campbell of the 4th Pennsylvania Regiment from the files of last session, praying that the commutation of his half pay or a sum equivalent thereto which he paid into the treasury, in lieu of the pension granted to him by a law of Congress in 1791, may be refunded to him for the reasons therein stated; referred to the committee of claims.

Mr. Lyon presented the petition of Sally Musk praying to be allowed the ferry and tract of land on which she resides between the Indiana territory and Kaskaskia; referred to the committee appointed on the petition from Randolph & St. Clair counties in said territory.

Mr. Rodney presented the petition of John Christian Topless an old soldier in the Delaware regiment who had been wounded through the right foot and ankle, but so far recovered as to be able to do his own work; he prays an allowance for his expenses, time, and trouble in this business. Referred to the committee of claims.

Mr. Lyon presented a petition from Elisha Winters who had been robbed on the Mississippi by a band known by the name of Mason's party, for whose apprehension or extermination a reward of 500 dollars was offered by the proclamation of government; one of his own party shot Mason, and two of the gang were afterwards apprehended, and upon his testimony convicted. He prays an allowance for his expenses, time, and trouble in this business. Referred to the committee of claims.

The House on motion of Mr. Epes took up the consideration of the bill regulating the clearance of armed merchant vessels; the consideration of the new section mentioned in the proceedings of yesterday was resumed. Mr. Epes moved an amendment thereof, and after some discussion it was ordered that the new section reported by the committee of the whole together with the amendment should be printed for the use of the members, with a view of bringing it critically under the consideration of the House.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole on the bill for establishing rules and articles for the government of the armies of the United States.

Mr. I. C. SMITH in the chair. After some time spent in considering the same. The committee rose, reported progress and asked and obtained leave to sit again.

The senate of Pennsylvania, have issued a summons commanding William Wilson, sergeant at arms to that body, to summon the honorable Edward Shippen, Esquire, chief justice of the supreme court of Pennsylvania, and Jasper Yates & Thomas Smith, Esquires, associate justices of the same court, that they be, and appear at the bar of the senate, in the borough of Lancaster, on the first Monday in January next, to answer an article of accusation and impeachment for a high misdemeanor of the said chief justice and the associate justices aforesaid, in their official capacities, exhibited against them, by the house of representatives, in their name, and in the name of the people of Pennsylvania.

Mr. MERRY, the Hon. the M. Jesty's Minister, has arrived at Washington City.

The Legislature of Virginia have re-elected E. M. Lige, governor of that state for the ensuing year.

The electors of North Carolina have given an unanimous vote for Thomas Jefferson, as president and Geo. Clinton, as vice-president of the United States. The number of electors is fourteen.

A Philadelphia paper of the 14th inst. says—"A letter from Capt. Jones of the ship Ferns, says that he had dismounted upon his return was in distress, and that he should have liberty to proceed to Amsterdam, there being NO BLOCKADE."

Extract of a letter from Wilkinson, to a gentleman in Augusta, dated, November 18th, 1804.

"The chief of the nation have declared they will not send a ship to Washington City, and have closed a treaty with England, by which they have ceded the south of Oskumidge to the English, and a sum of two hundred thousand dollars."

IMPROVEMENT.

On the 29th ult. a bridge or rather 2 bridges, from the banks of the Connecticut river, in Brattleborough, Vt and Hindsale, Massachusetts, to an island in the centre, were opened. One bridge is 350 and the other 260 feet in length; and by their means an uninterrupted turnpike road is continued from Boston to Hilsown Springs the shortest distance of 170 miles.

On the 3d inst. an excellent bridge 800 feet in length, across the Hudson, from Waterford to Lansingburg, New York was opened with much ceremony and eclat. A procession of military, civil, and mercantile, formed at Lansingburg, crossed the bridge and partook of a entertainement at Waterford; the governor and other respectable characters being among the guests.

Port of Baltimore.

From Borden's Marine-List.
December 18.

Arrived, schooner Maryland, Murphy, 18 days from Jernicoff—L. McKim and T. Tenant. In the Calico passage was chased by three French privateers and escaped by superior sailing.

Left at Jernicoff the following Baltimore vessels:
Ship Ardent, Smith; brigs Fanny, Bounds, Hunter, Philip, and Alliance; Isabella, Craig; Joseph Beard; schooner Felicity, West; Victory, Howe; Alexander, Everfont; John Bartlett and Eleanor, — all of which vessels, except the Isabella and Joseph, would sail in a few days.
Heard that the Amphion and Nonpareil had failed a few days before from Port au Prince, for Baltimore, and the Nancy, Westcott, from L'Ance a Veaux, for do. Also, schooner Rofannah, Mooney, 19 days from Cape Francois. Logwood—James Biays. Came out in co. with schooner Mills; for Baltimore same night. Left schooner Paragon, Tartar, Plato and Mary Ann, for Baltimore in 10 days. Passed, brig Betsey & Peggy, from Savannah, bound up.

Also brig American, Houston, 5 days from Penzance—Wine—Wm Cole.

Also ship Maryland, Stiles, 57 days from Amsterdam. Left at the Texel, 22. O.A. ship Diana, Holbrook; Harriot, Pierce; Aurora, Bowles; Jane, McCarty, of Baltimore; Swift, of New York, and Cleopatra, of Philadelphia; lately arrived five American vessels, the day they failed, names unknown. The James, Wells; Seine, Jencks, of Baltimore; with a number of others, failed 2 days before. October 23, the day after failing, spoke ship Montezuma, Dahlfeld, from Baltimore to Rotterdam, had been 10 days beating in the north sea, and sprung the head of his foremast, had just received a pilot. 27th, spoke ship Victory, Mitchell, from Boston, to Rotterdam, out 26 days; same day, ship Tipico, Smith, 6 days from London, for Savannah. November 19, ship Orlando, Gibbs, 28 days from London, for New York. 25th, ship Minerva, from Savannah to Liverpool, out 10 days. December 13th, ship Thomas, Gordon, 45 days from Madeira, for New York.
The brig Henrietta, Darnell, from Bordeaux, is in the bay.

Philadelphia, December 17.

Arrived, ship Harriot, Johnson, Havannah, via Charleston; brig Augustus, Gantlett, Havannah; schooner Citizen, Fraley, Savannah; William Wright, Robt, Port de Paix; sloop Lark, Jones, Norfolk.

Cleared, brig Sally and Hetty, Evans, Lehigh; ships Lovely Laïs, Clark, Nantz; Eliza Herrick, Dublin; Laurel, Hazeltine, Charleston; schooner Rebecca, Da Costa, St. Croix; sloop Sally, Hand, Alexandria.

Ship John Bulkley, Clay, of this port arrived at Amsterdam, and proceeded for India.

Arrived the Saunders, Singleton, from Madeira. Left the 12th November, ship Grace, of New York for St. Thomas in 10 days; ship Hampton, of Philadelphia, for Calcutta, in 36 days; ship Charles and Harriot, full arrived in 45 days from New York.

Captain Singleton spoke no vessels on his passage home. The Saunders has completed 2 voyages, hence to Madeira and back in 147 days.

Schooner William Wright, capt. Rofs, left at Port au Prince, 24th November.—Brig Sophia, H. Well, of Philadelphia; brig Antelope, Nicholson, of Baltimore in 3 days; and parted off there with several vessels from Baltimore under convoy of a large armed ship and brig, bound to leeward.—Three schooners from Baltimore, had previously touched there, and proceeded to leeward; schooner Baltimore, arrived from Baltimore, after having been ashore, and intended for leeward; also, Chappel, from Baltimore, with the lots of her tender and one man—after having been overhauled by a French privateer and being in distress, suffered to proceed. At Cape Francois, to fail for Philadelphia in 3 weeks; brig Union, and Lovely Lucy.—Off Cape François, captain Rofs was boarded by the Tartar, and off Port au Plat by the La Plaze, both British frigates.

Entered, brig Lucy, Braggdon, Guadeloupe; schooner Carolina, Harvey, Charleston; sloop Ranger, Edwards, Philadelphia.
