Our fertile plains no longvoluptuous citizens; instead of waste, ruin and destruction, evils inseparably attached to military combinations, the earth produces its wonted luxuriance; and progressive inroads of vice upon virtue, by an abandoned soldiery, no longer goad the feelings of the pious, or disturb the calm serenity of the chaste and moral. Our national debt is diminishing with unheard of and astonishing progression. Our lands and our houses are exempted from that rigid 'axation' which was a conspicuous feature of the Adams' administration. In fine, every thing rolls smoothly on which tends to advance the welfare of the people, and glory of the nation.


