The following paragraph is from the Baltimore Federal Gazette of December 17th.

Defalcator.—In the legislature of N. York on the 12th ult. a committee reported that from information obtained it appeared a large balance was due from Philip Ten Eyck, one of the managers of the late lottery for the encouragement of literature, estimated at about thirty thousand dollars, which he declares himself unable to make good. In consequence of which, said Ten Eyck has been dismissed.

We apprehend that the intention of this paragraph is to serve, at the expense of the State of New York a lottery of magnitude which is now in operation in the state of Maryland. On this account we think it proper to say that at the extra session of the legislature of this state convened in November last, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the United States an appropriation was made, by the legislature, to cover, and which actually does cover the defalcation suffered. The integrity of the lottery of the state of New York is guaranteed by its legislature.

An error having crept into several of the American prints in relation to General TURNAU, by giving him the name of Thurot, which may be the cause of very incorrect impressions, we take a pleasure in laying before our readers the following sketch of the various stations filled by him, by which it appears that he has been without intermission, engaged in the service of his country from nearly the commencement of the revolution to the present time. The events of this interesting period are sufficiently strong in the recollection of our readers, to show that the General has participated in many of the most splendid incidents of the war, while his constant occupation proves his having possessed in an eminent degree the confidence of the Nation.

General TURNER entered the service at the end of the year 1791. Made a campaign in the north in quality of chief of battalion in 1792. Made the campaign of Treves in quality of Colonel. 1792. That of Arlon in 1792. General of brigade and commander of the advanced guard of the army of the west. Made general of division upon the field of battle. 1794. General in chief of the army of the Pyrenees, of the east and the west. 1794. Commandant general at Belle Isle. Arrested, detained, tried and unjustly acquitted by a council of war. 1795. Sent to the army of the Sambre & Meuse. 1796. Commandant of the first division of the French army in Germany in 1797. Commanded two divisions of the army of Mayence, at the blockade of Ehrenbreitstein in 1798.

Commandant of the first division of the army before Mannheim, at the commencement of hostilities. 1799. Commandant of the first division of the army of Helvetia, general of all the grenadiers, carbeneers and dragoons of the army of Helvetia, Commander in chief of that army (par interim) 1800. Lieutenant general commandant of the left wing of the army of Italy. Sent at the peace by government, in order to form a general outline of a military road, proper for the convenience of artillery of any calibre, and to determine the places for fortifications, either permanent or provisional, upon the chain of the Alps. 1801. Sent to Switzerland on a political military mission. 1803. Nominated minister plenipotentiary from France to the United States of America, in Dec 1804. [Nat. Intelligencer.]
