From Baltimore, by Elkton's Lower and New Market, to Fredericktown twice a week. Leave Fredericktown every Saturday at 9 p m and arrive at Baltimore on Sunday and Wednesday by 6 p m. Return from Baltimore every Tuesday and Friday at 6 p m and arrive at Fredericktown on Wednesday and Saturday by 6 p m.

From Baltimore, by Elkton's Lower and New Market, to Fredericktown twice a week. Leave Fredericktown every Tuesday at 3 a m and arrive at Baltimore on Wednesday by 11 a m. Return from Baltimore every Tuesday at 1 p m and arrive at Fredericktown by 8 p m.

From Baltimore, by Newmarket, Hagerstown and Shepherdstown, to Fredericktown once a week. Leave Fredericktown every Wednesday at 8 a m and arrive at Hagerstown on Saturday by 10 a m. Leave Hagerstown every Saturday at 2 p m and arrive at Fredericktown on Tuesday by 6 p m.

From Baltimore, by Annapolis three times a week. Leave Baltimore every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 8 a m and arrive at Annapolis by 5 p m. Return from Annapolis every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 5 p m and arrive at Baltimore by 5 p m.

From Annapolis, by Haddaway's, St. Michaels, Easton, Cambridge, Vienna, Salisbury, Princess Ann and Snowhill, to Salisbury twice a week. NOYERS. THE Post-master General may expedite the mails and after the times of arrival and departure any time during the continuance of the contracts, he stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

15. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mails at all offices where no particular time is specified. 16. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the time prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and if the delay continues until the departure of any depending mail, whereby the mails destined for such depending mail lose a trip, an additional forfeiture of five dollars shall be incurred.

17. No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail. 18. Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals. 19. The Post-master General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever three failures happen which amount to the loss of a trip each.
