Want of-bread has driven the lower classes to great extremity, and in consequence to some shocking outrages In one town the poorer inhabitants have risen in a mob and hanged the governor."

Extract of a letter from Tunis, dated August 20th, 1804.

Naples, inspired by our during acts continues to annoy this coast. I learn (and the intelligence may be relied on, though we cannot give the detail) that the Tunisian squadron has been separate and attacked in disserent stations by their enemy. Three Tunisian gallies, on board of which were nearly 700 men, made an attack upon a Neapolitan frigate: one it is faid was funk and the other two contur ed: part of the action was seen from Mount Ras Jebel, near Porto Farino, ard a number of dead bodies have since floated on shore. We have also accounts of four other corfuirs being captured by the Neapolitans. A frigate is cruising between Porto Farino and Bona.

His catholic majesty's regulia arrived on the 18th inflant, to wit: Iwo Xebecs, mounting 30 pieces of cannon each, 70,000 dollars in cash, a regalia for the Sapatapa, with the usual consular present.
