The prices affixed in the subjoined table are those of the Illinois; had the London prices been given, we should be assonished at the immense fums which the Missisppi yields to the fince peltries have been exported from America by way of the Ohio; it is to be desired that the eastern part of America should encourage this exportation, by rais-Canada.
