"Upon the mountain of Geneva an obelisk is erected in honor of Napoleon the First, as an Emperor of the French. If we are to judge from the number of monuments, &c. the wish to commemorate the period of this fortunate are with the name of his Majetty, no fovereign before was ever so much beloved by his people In different parts of France, within ten months; 62 statues and 24 obelisks have been erected in honor of his Majesty; 52 cities and towns have demanded the honor and favor of changing their former names into that of Napoleon, 220 Napo-Icon or Bonaparte squares exist already. and the number of Napoleon or Bonaparte fireets, amount already to upwards of 6000. Already 1702 municipalities and 44 prefectaries have been graciously bonored with his Majesty's picture. During the years of 11 and 12 alone (1803 and 1804) according to the regillers of the clergy, as well as of the police; 10,504 children have been baptized either Napoleon or Bonaparte; add to these the great number of musea, lycea pritances, colleges, bridges, rivers, lakes, thips of the line, frig-tes, cutters, privateers, gun boats, public gardens, plants, planets, flars, &c. all honored with his imperial Majesty's chrittian or family name."

Swindling .- A recent instance of swindling has occurred in the city, which, both for the purpose of exposing a scoundrel and putting the public on their guard against him, ought not to pass unnoticed. A person calling himself J. Barclay Croker, and who says that he comes from a house in London, has lately ushered himself into public notice as a Goldsmith, Jeweller, &c. and has so far imposed on the public as to possess himself of many valuable articles in the line of his pretended profession. Sus. pecling, as it seems, that he could not continue his refarious practices lunger his lodgings on Sunday last, and has not since been heard of Some circumstanc. es lead to conjecture that he has gone to Nortolk or Richmond. had lately stolen.—This, added to the attempt above; and to the diabolical disposition exhibited in the late numerous fires, calls for peculiar vigilance in our citizens generally, and in the guardians of the night in particular, until one or two tremendous examples shall deter others from similar attempts.


