Referred to Mr. Newell, Wynns, Dennis, Gray and Varnum.

An enrolled bill authorizing the Secretary at War to issue military land-warrants, was read the third time and passed.

A message was received from the Senate, notifying that they have passed the bill providing for the government of the Territory of Orleans.

The said bill was read the first and second time and committed to a committee of the whole house to-morrow.

Ordered, that the petition of sundry inhabitants of the district of Washington, (Mass.) be referred to the committee of commerce and manufactures.

The house, according to the order of the day, resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

Mr. GREGG in the chair,

On the report of the committee of claims on the memorial of Richard Taylor, and after some time spent therein, the committee rose and reported the following resolution, which received the concurrence of the house.

Resolved, that the prayer of the memorial of Richard Taylor is reasonable and ought to be granted.

Ordered that the committee of claims have leave to bring in a bill pursuant to the said resolution.

The order of the day was called for on the bill to make Plymouth, in North Carolina, a port of entry—when

A motion was made to postpone it until the 3d of March next, and the question being put, it was agreed to.

Mr. Thomas presented a bill supplementary to the act regulating the grants of land appropriated for the refugees from the British provinces of Canada and Nova Scotia, which was read the first and second time and committed to a committee of the whole house to-morrow.

Mr. Dana from the committee of claims presented a bill for the relief of Richard Taylor, which was read the first and second time and committed to a committee of the whole house, to-morrow.

Mr. Dana also presented a bill for the relief of William A. Barron, which was read the first and second time and committed to a committee of the whole house to-morrow.

A petition was presented from Isaac Sears, of Kintale, (Mass.) and referred to the committee of claims.

Mr. Eppes from the committee to whom was re-committed the bill farther to extinguish the debts due from the United States, made a report, which was ordered to lie on the table.

Ordered, that the committee last mentioned be discharged from the consideration of petitions and memorials of Edmund Brooke, John Chamberlain, Eli Elmer and Moses Young, and that they be severally referred to the committee of claims

Adjourned.

Captain James Bird, of the brig Polly, of Providence, who arrived at this port on Tuesday from Amsterdam and 77 days from the Texel to the Capes, has politely favored the Editors of the American with the following Marine Intelligence:

Arrived at Amsterdam, November 12, 1834, the brig William and Mary, Geo. Eaterby master, from Charleston, in 43 days passage to the Texel. 24th arrived ship Howe, Johnson, of Boston, 3 months out.

Captain Bird left there the ship John Jay, John Fry master, of Providence; ship Charlotte, John Manchler master, of do; ship Nancy, Walden, of Newburyport; and ship Fame, Jones, of Philadelphia.

Spoke January 8, 1835, in lat. 26. N. long. 52. W. brig Juno, Stone, of Kennebunk, bound to Surinam, out 19 days, supplied captain Bird with a cask of water of which he stood much in need. January 9 spoke brig Ench, O. Jones, master, from Bolton, bound to Martinico, out 11 days.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Madrid, dated 24th November, 1804.

"On the 21st instant, at 11 o'clock at night, orders were received from Madrid, for laying an embargo on all British ships and property. Two vessels which happened to be in the bay, were immediately detained, and a strict search has since been making for effects and funds, belonging to the subjects of that nation, which when found out are put into deposit, until the results of the actual negotiation are known. It is generally presumed that a rupture between the two kingdoms, is inevitable.

A similar sequestration has taken place at Cadix.

Extract of a letter from captain William Thompson, of the brig Horatia, of Newhaven, dated Nevis, January 2, 1805.

"I am under the disagreeable necessity of informing you, that on the 25th ult. I had Robert Alling, my mate, and two of my people, viz. Russel Davenport, and Eugene Olmstead, impressed by the British ship Carysfort, Captain M'Enzie, off St. Lucia; they being all the seamen on board at the time, and left the brig riding at a small hawser, with only a boy and a cook on board—nor would they allow time to let go an anchor, nor give us the liberty of going on board them—they refused to look at their protections, with which they were all furnished—they also pillaged several articles, for which they refused payment. I have forwarded a protest to the commandore in hopes to procure their release."

Arrive, ship Argo, Field, from Calcutta. Sailed on the 27th of August. Left there brig Industry, Stone, of Newburyport; brig Rufus, Wayne, of Boston; ship Montezuma, Ashmead, of Philadelphia; one Spanish and 4 or 5 Portuguese. Spoke, September 2, off Kidger, brig Washington, Allen, of S. I. from Batavia, last from the coast of Sumatra, bound to Calcutta, having been unsuccessful in procuring a cargo at either place. Captain Becket was supposed by captain Allen, to have arrived at Calcutta, but had not when the Argo sailed. January 31, lat. 37, long. 70, brig Bellona, 16 days from Jamaica for New-York. February 4, schr. Jeffries, from Salem; blowing fresh, could not learn the particulars; at the same time a ship and schooner in sight, standing southward. 5th, brig Washington, from Newburyport. 8th, ship Damascota, Becket, 24 hours from Boston for Lisbon.

Captain Field had a heavy blow in the Bay of Bengal, which lasted from the 18th till the 18th September; and a very heavy gale from the N. W. in lat. 37, N. long. 75, W. from the 28th till the evening of the 31st Jan.

#### February 14.

Arrived, brig William and Charles, Killiam, from Martinico. Left there, January 17, schr. Madockawando, Haraden, for Salem, in 15 days; ship Franklin, Rich, for Boston, in 70; brig Rebecca, Turner, for Portsmouth, in 40; schr. Morning Star, M. R. for Portland, in 3; brig Polly, Almy, of Newport, in 4; schooner Henrietta, Gilpin, for Alexandria, in 14; schr. Union, Strout, for Salem, in 20; brig Sophia, Milward, for New York, in 30; schr. Patience, Blunt, of Alexandria, just arrived.

Also, barque, Pompey, Gilchrist, from the Cape of Good Hope. Left at the Cape, Nov. 17, ships Argus, Chamberlain, of and for Norfolk, in 25 days; Rose, Cary, for Nantucket, in 2; Harry and Francis, Folger, from Batavia, for Boston, in 10; Columbia, Barnard, to leave the Cape in January. Spoke Jan. 25, lat. 41, N. long. 58, W. a brig from Surinam for Portland, vessel's name unknown. Dining Lee, master. 24 h, lat. 32, N. long. 68, W. brig Camillus, Nathaniel Keonard, master, 60 days from Guadaloupe for Portsmouth, had been driven off the coast twice, had sprung his fore mast and fore-yard, his vessel very leaky, the captain quite sick, and no provisions on board.—relieved him Sch. Swan, Amos Simmonds, master, from New Bedford, for the Cape de Verdes, was spoken January 8 h; had lost his bows, and otherwise damaged in a gale of wind. 25 h, lat. 23, 25, N. long. 69, 30 W. brig Fame, of Badeloid, Lewis M'Leellan, master, 15 days from Antigua for Boston. February 6 h, lat. 39, 40, N. long. 69, W. brig Dana, of Providence, for the first port he could fetch on the continent, Sevester Simmonds, master, 64 days from Cadix, had been on the coast 20 days, his people all much frozen, and three off duty by sickness; his vessel leaky, and very little provisions on board; could not supply him, the weather being rough.

Also, brig Rambler, Capt. Jos. Bowditch, 191 days from Canton. Left there ships Nankin, Cunningham; Wanderer, Prescott, and Jenny, Dorr, all of Boston. The Mount Vernon, of Philadelphia, and two other ships, supposed to be American, passed up the river, from Macos, the 5th of August. Spoke, off the Cape of Good Hope, ship Elizabeth, of Baltimore, 2 days from the Cape bound to Batavia. The Cape in sight spoke the ship —, Johnson, of a Dutch New York, from the Isle of France Lat. 6, S. long. 27, W. was boarded by a Liverpool Guineaman—she fired several shot at the Rambler;—Capt Bowditch received the most unprincipled abuse and inhuman treatment from this ship. Lat. 20 long. 59, W. was boarded by a French privateer, and treated politely. Lat. 36 33, long. 70, spoke ship Bellona, from Antigua, bound to New York. Feb. 10, parted with the Diana, from Point Patre, for Boston.

New-York February 23.

Arrived since our last, —12 or 14 sloops from Eastern ports. The found is clear of ice, and many vessels were altern bound down.

Also the following vessels through the found.—The brig Thomas, Allen, in 3 weeks from New Bedford informs that the ship Fabius is at anchor two miles above Hell-gate. Packet ship Minerva, Living, from New York and New London. The sloop Fame, Earl, from Nantucket, came out in company from New London. Schooner Eagle, Allen, in 22 days from Martinico. Left the brig Connecticut, Bl. of Hartford, to sail in 20 days for New York; brig Ontario, Eldridge, of Norwich, in 10 days for New York; brig Fair Manhattan, for New York; schr. Webb, of New York; William Henry, Strackford, to sail next day, for New York; ship Paragon, of New York, waiting for coffee, and others not recollected. February 7, in lat. 28, long 68, captain Allen was chased 6 hours by a British frigate, but outlived her. Feb. 22, in lat.

64, long. 69, spoke the ship Ocean, from Norfolk for Jamaica.

Sloop Nancy, Lamson, from Little Egg-Harbor, having on board, captain Sures, of the schooner Commerce, of Fairfield, from Newbern for New York; which vessel went ashore at the above place on the 10th inst and will be left. The cargo was landed on the beach.

Below last night, the ship Four Sisters, Moores, in 66 days from Nantz.

As the wind last night was fresh from the Southward we may reasonably expect many arrivals this day and to-morrow.
