Extract of a letter from an afficer on board the United States frigate Congress, dated " Of Tripoli, October 26, 1804"-Received by the John Adams.

" We have been cruizing off Tripoli since the 23d of September in company with the schooner Nautilus, and have blockaded the port faithfully. What you have heard respecting the impossibility of a large ship going into this harbor, is untrue: we can go within twenty yards of their batteries with sasety, and have indeed more water than we want, say ten fathoms. This desirable knowledge was obtained one monn-shine night, by captain Rogers himself, accompanied by the maller. They even found that when the boat grounded forward, and the master jumped upon the rocks she had seven fathoms aftern. They were then so near as to hear centinels converse - saw all the gun.boats, and examined the coast completely, taking the bearings of the Bashaw's caftle from every sound, and got fafe on board the schooner at three in the morning. It appears strange the boat was not discovered, as the was within pissol shot of every battery they have .--Whether the enemy saw her or not, it is certain they took no apparent notice of

In my way up the Mediterranean, I have been much gratified in visiting that celebrated nell of robbers, the city of Algiers. I saw many poor Christian naves at work (in different employs) who, as we passed, would call a look of joy and happinels, as it were, towards us, no doubt arising from the simple circumstance of our being called christians like themselves. Many of them stretched out their hands towards us, with a look (for they dare not speak) "that spoke, as well as look could speak," " a penny for a poor Captive." I need not tell you my feelings on this occasion—suffice it, that when ! went ashore I had 36 dollars in my picket, and returned on board without a penny. I am told that a slave for one third of a dollar, can purchase a day of fest, and even of amusement-if that be the case, I am happy that I visited them.

"The Dey of Algiers paid us great attention; faluting our ship on her arrival with 21 gums, which we returned The captain on landing was saluted with five guns—the first instance of their saluting an American captain on landing We procured at this place refreshments for our crew, who were very fickly; and received also a handsome present from his infernal Majesty, contisting of theep, buffaloes, frelli bread, and vegetables."

Died at Otaheite, POMARRE, King of that Island. He was a great idolator, & a zealous promoter of his country's abominations. He had killed, in his time, a vast purcher of human sacrifices, perhaps not sewer than two thousand.

DIED, at Glove, nsar Athenry, (Eng.) of a short illness, Mr. Dems Coorobee, of Ballindangin, aged one hundred and seventeen; a truly honest man. He retained his faculties to the last. He was married seven times, and when married to the last wife he was 93 years old: By them all he had 48 chudren, 236 grand children, 944 great grand children, and 25 great great grand children, the oldest of whom is four years-& his own youngest son (by his last wife) is about 18 years old.
