York, dated December 14th. "The crops have to completely failed throughout the whole kingdom that every grain of wheat necessary for the support of the country must be imported.

Great Britain has also been one cause of the fudden rife of grain and flour: but this mult have taken place from other, though not els powerful caules viz. from a conviction of the impossibility of receiving a fufficient fupply either from Europe or America. The bell calculation is that the province of Andalusia alone will require 1.500 000 bulbels of grain, or that equivalent in flour, till June next; and the principal exportation is from the United States. From the north of Eu rope (say the Baltic) it is known to a certainty that every veffel has come forward, and the impracticability of the navigation of these less till May next, or Jun, will preclude all hopes of receiving any further jupplies. The fane reason will hold as to the navigation of the Black Sea and the supplies that in ght be expected from Russia; and the quantity in the Mediterranean is to triffing as hardly to merit notice. Bonaparte having prehibited the exportation wherever his controul or influence extended, although, to fatilfy the repeated to icitations of Spain he has consented under certain consitions to permit the exportation of grain f om eertain ports of France; yet, fuch were the reffrictions, that it would be foily to fup pose any will come forward from th nice.
