AN ORDINANCE

To appropriate a sum of money for the finishing of the Town Clock and Alarm Bell

Be it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That there be paid by the register of the city, to the elders, deacons and trustees of the German reform congregation, the sum of seven hundred and twenty dollars, provided that the elders, deacons & trustees of the said congregation shall give bond to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, in the penal sum of three thousand dollars, conditioned that the said clock shall at all times be kept in good repair and use, accidents by fire and lightning excepted, for and during the term of seven years, and that the said bell shall be kept in good order, except from the accidents aforesaid during the term aforesaid, and that this corporation shall at all times have free access thereto, and full right to have the same rung at such times and on such occasions as they may think proper.

Yesterday the body of Mr. Jeremiah P. Ryan was taken out of Jones Falls, opposite Plowman-street. It is supposed that he was at the fire in Od town on the 20th ult. and in returning lost his way from the darkness of the night, and accidentally fell into the falls. This opinion is corroborated by a similar circumstance which occurred on the same evening—Several gentlemen upon hearing the cry of fire were hastening towards Old-town, and from the darkness of the evening, plunged into the falls assistance, however, was immediately afforded, which prevented the fatal consequences which might otherwise have resulted.  
A coroner's jury was summoned who brought in a verdict, "Accidental death by drowning."

TO THE PUBLIC.

CONFORMABLE to the ideas suggested by "The Widows Friend" (the AMERICAN of February 23) the following plan, a revised and corrected by a few respectable citizens, convened together for that purpose is proposed to the citizens of Baltimore for their consideration and adoption. A subscription paper will be opened at the Mayor's office, where any citizen desirous to promote the views of the society, may call and subscribe for a share or any number of shares of stock that may be wished for.

BALTIMORE BENEVOLENT SOCIETY FOR THE BENEFIT OF FEMALES.

ARTICLE I  
To encourage females readily to pursue the virtuous path of honest industry, We the subscribers, have associated ourselves under the title and a petition of the "Baltimore Benevolent Society for the benefit of females," and the efforts of the society shall be particularly directed to procure constant employment for honest industrious females of ever (descriptive and religious denomination, in all such kind of useful needle work as they can leverally perform with most profit to themselves and advantage to the society.

ARTICLE II  
A capital stock of 5000 dollars shall be borrowed in shares of 20 dollars each as a loan from such benevolent persons as may be disposed to promote the view or to become members of the society. The directors however may increase the number of shares from time to time, if they may judge it expedient. Certificates of shares of stock shall be issued in the respective names of the members of the society, transferable however to their order & payable to bearer. The holder of any three or shares of stock as soon as his or her name is required as such by the secretary, shall be considered a member of the society. But any holder of any share or shares of stock may at any time resign his membership; and on giving notice to the secretary of such intention at any time three months previously to the first Monday of any June, he may immediately thereafter receive from the society the full amount of such share or shares of stock as may have been offered for payment.

ARTICLE III  
The business of the society shall be under the immediate care and government of a board of 14 directors, all of whom shall be members of the society. The directors shall be chosen by a majority of the votes of the stockholders or as soon thereafter as 250 shares may be subscribed for public notice of which shall be given in the different newspapers in the city. Every member of the society shall be entitled to as many votes as he or she may hold shares at the time of the election; provided nevertheless, that no individual be entitled, on any account to more than five votes at any election. No vote shall be taken by ballot; but any vote may be given in person or by proxy as may be most convenient. But should any director die, resign, or refuse to serve, after having been elected by the stockholders, then the remaining directors shall choose another in his stead. In like manner also shall every future vacancy which may take place in consequence of death, resignation of any member of the board, be filled

up by a majority of the directors for the time being, provided nevertheless, that no more than four members belonging to the same religious society be in this manner chosen to serve as directors at the same time.

ARTICLE IV  
The directors or a majority of them shall elect from among the felves, a President Secretary and Committee of three. And in case of the death or resignation of any President, Secretary or member of the committee or three the directors shall, as soon as convenient appoint another in his stead.

ARTICLE V  
The directors shall choose a treasurer, who, before he enters in his office, shall give bond and security to the President and directors, for the faithful discharge of the trust reposed in him. The Treasurer shall keep in his possession all the cash funds of the society subject only to the order of the directors and signed by the President and Secretary. The directors shall also appoint a superintendent & such other assistants and servants as, from time to time, they may suppose will best promote the views and interests of the society. They shall also fix & determine upon such salary or wages as they may think proper and he funds of the society will admit, to be paid to the superintendent, assistants or servants; and in case of the misconduct or neglect of duty of any superintendent, assistant or servant the directors may immediately dismiss him or her from the service of the society, and employ another in his or her stead.

ARTICLE VI  
The directors shall meet monthly, or as often as may be judged expedient by them, and on such days as they may appoint. One third of the directors meeting shall form a board, competent to transact the business of the society. And in case of the absence of the president or secretary or of either of them, the directors present, before they enter on any business, shall elect from among themselves a president and secretary, pro tem, who shall do and act in every respect as if the president and secretary, or both, were present. An accurate record of the proceedings of the directors shall be kept by the secretary, in a book provided for that purpose.

ARTICLE VII  
The committee of three shall meet weekly, or as often as the interests of the society should seem to require. This committee shall pay every possible attention to the concerns of the society during the recess of the board; conforming themselves however in all such matters to the instruction given them by the directors.

ARTICLE VIII  
The directors shall nominate thirty Ladies, who shall be titled "Visitors of the Baltimore Benevolent Society" and on the death or resignation of any visitor, the directors shall nominate another in her stead. Four of the visitors (three shall reside west of Howard street; six west of Charles street extending to Howard street and including Federal Hill; ten west of the Falls and extending to Charles street; five east of Jones's Falls and extending to Harford run, and five on Fell's Point) it shall be the duty of the visitors to visit, at convenient times such females, or families of females, residing in their respective districts as may be admitted in the employ of the society. But further it shall be their more especial care to advise any female, whom they may visit, against the dangers and folly of idleness and dissipation and to encourage them steadily to pursue the path of virtue and honest industry, as the only means by which they can maintain an unspotted character or acquire with any credit to themselves, the common necessaries and comforts of life. The visitors shall be furnished by the secretary with the names and places of residence of all persons employed by the society; and any visitor may verbally or in writing report to the secretary or any director, or as often as may be in their own opinion necessary or convenient, of the merits or demerits, the circumstances or necessities of any female or family of females whom they may have visited.

ARTICLE IX  
Any pious and industrious female, who may wish to be employed by the society, must apply personally or by letter to the superintendent. A satisfactory recommendation will in every case be required; but on such being produced the superintendent may give out any piece of work on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed by the directors. When any preference becomes necessary, the directors shall possess full power to grant it to such females as may be most deserving and in most need of the assistance of the society; but no female shall in any case be given to any female in preference to another on account of the particular religious tone she may happen to possess. The directors may also refuse admittance to or dismiss from the employment of the society; any female whose conduct may render her unworthy the care or the confidence of the society.

ARTICLE X  
It shall be the duty of the superintendent to conform himself in all things to the direction of the Board. To which effect he shall give bond and security before he enters into the employ of the society. But more particularly it shall be his duty to receive and to take care of all furniture and materials purchased for the use of the society. He shall also be re-

sponsible for all clothes, tools, and effects that may be brought in by any person to made use under the direction of the society, and the superintendent or assistant shall cut out and prepare a parcel of the work to be given out to each individual in the employ of the society; and it shall be the duty of the superintendent to examine every piece of work when finished and to see that it is done in a proper manner. He shall also open an account with each individual or family of females, admitted into the employment of the society, and he shall charge her or them with the materials entrusted to them, from day to day, and he shall regularly give them credit for the same, when returned, together with such sums as may be allowed by the directors for their work when done.

ARTICLE XI  
The directors shall allow customary prices for a work done for the use of the society, and shall pay the same daily or weekly, as may best suit the individuals in their employ. But at the end of every three, six or twelve months, as the directors may judge most expedient, the secretary, with the assistance of the superintendent, shall prepare an accurate statement of all the work done, expences incurred and profits gained, so as to ascertain, as nearly as can be, the existing funds of the society. And if it should appear that any profits have been gained by the society, the directors shall declare a dividend of two thirds of the whole amount of such profits, to be divided among those who have been employed by the society, proportionably to the work which may have been done by them respectively; and the remaining third part of said profits shall be applied by the directors towards redeeming or increasing their capital stock;—in premiums to the most industrious and deserving, among those who have been employed by the society; or towards the establishment and support of any public institution which they may suppose most likely to promote the industry, the virtue or knowledge of the inhabitants of this city.

ARTICLE XII  
The directors shall make by laws and form all such regulations, as to them may appear necessary, to promote the laws of the society or the government and direction of their own board. They shall rent or hire such rooms, as may be supposed by them most fit and proper to carry on the business of the society, and they shall also purchase and contract for all kind of materials for the use of the society, and they shall sell or dispose of the same, and all manufactures made up for the society, to the best advantage. And whenever it may be judged expedient, the directors shall open a school room, where young women and children not under ten years of age may be taught or improved in the necessary use of the needle, under the care of the superintendent or an assistant. And such young women and children shall be allowed a reasonable price for all the work they may do in the school room; but the whole divided in proportion to the amount of their work, shall if the directors think fit be paid to their teacher as a compensation for his trouble in teaching them.

ARTICLE XIII  
The directors shall annually report to the stockholders in a general statement and program of the society, particularly showing the quantum of work done, the number of scholars employed, the profits gained and losses sustained by the society. And the directors, or, in case of this refusal, one fifth part of the members of the society, for the time being, may call a general meeting of the society, (one month's public notice thereof being previously given in the several newspapers of the city) and the society, at any such general meeting may finally dissolve the society if judged expedient by two thirds of the members present, or they may alter and amend these articles in any manner as may more effectually promote the views of the society.
