> City of Baltimore. (BY AUTHORITY.)

(No. XVI.) AN ORDINANCE

To provide for the inspection and admeasurement of buildings erected within the city of Baltimore.

DE it enacted and ordained by the mayor D and city council of Baltimore, That there be appointed four persons of good repute and well skilled in the quality of honse carpenters' and joiners' work, to measure and inspect such work in all buildings heretofore erected, altered or repaired within the city, where the contract of parties shall not otherwise pro-

Sec. 2. And be it enacted and ordained. That there be appointed four persons of good repute and well skilled in the quality of stone masons' and bricklayers' work, to measure and inspect such work in all build. ings hereaster erecled. altered or repaired within the city where the contract of the parties does not otherwise provide.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted and ordained, That there be appointed four persons of good repute and well skilled in the quality of house plaisterers' work, to measure and inspected, altered or repaired within the city where the contract of the parties shall not otherwise provide.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted and ordained, That there be appointed four persons of good repure and well skilled in the quality of house painters' work, to measure and days for New York. inspect such work in all buildings hereafter crested, altered or repaired, within the city, where the contract of the parties shall not otherwise provides Sec 5. And be it enacted and ordained,

That whenever any dispute thatt take place between the proprietor of fuch building and the undertaker of fuch work, respecting the quantity or quality of the same, (and the contract of the parties shall not otherwise provide) it shall and may be lawful and either of the said parties shall have right to get the work about which they disagree, measured and inspected by any two of the person to be appointed un. der this ordinance to measure and inspect such kind of work, one of, whom shall be chosen by each of said parties; and if one party shall refuse to nominate; the other may choose both the laid inspectors; and it shall be the duty of such inspectors, when required fo to do, to measure and inspect the quantity and quality of such work. And the said inspectors shall have authority, and it is hereby declared to be their duty, to make such allowance for bad or detective work by them respectivey inspected as they shall, in their judgment and conscience, believe to be right and jult; and each of the sa d inspessors before he enters upon the duties of his office, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation, as the case may require, That he will, as an inspector and measurer, honestly and faithfully, without prejudice or savor, discharge the several duties required of him by this ordinance."

Sec. 6. And be it enacted and ordained, That if either of the faid parties shall wilmeasuring & inspecting the work aforesaid, (for which he may be appointed) when required so to do by the other party, their contract not otherwise providing, such party offending herein shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars, and the further sum of twenty dollars for each and every day he shall, in like manner, continue to kinder and prevent, against the wish of the other party, such work from being measured & inspected as aforesaid.

Sec. 7. And be it enacted and ordained, That the several inspectors aforesaid thall make out two bills of the particulars of the work by them respectively measured & inspected, and the value according to the quality of the said work, which shall be figned by them and delivered one to each party; and that the said inspectors shall be allowed one and a quarter per centum on the amount of the respective bills, as compensation for the duties imposed by this ordinance; to be paid by the parties in equal shares.
