Notice is hereby given,
That separate proposals will be received
at the office of the Secretary for the De-
partment of War, until 12 o'clock at noon of the
last Wednesday in June next, for the supply
of all rations that may be required for the use
of the United States, from the 1st day of
October 1865, until the 30th day of September
1866, both days inclusive, at the following
places, viz:

First, At Niagara, Detroit, Michilimackinac,
Fort Wayne, Chicago, Swan Creek, and
at any place or places, where troops are or
may be stationed, marched or recruited within
the state of Ohio, and territory of Michigan,
and at any place or places within the Indiana
territory north of the 41st degree of north
latitude.

Second, At South West Point, Tellico
Knoxville, Nashville, and within the Chero-
kee nation between Tennessee and Georgia,
and on the Tennessee river, and on the road
between said river and Nashville, and at any
place or places where troops are or may be
stationed, marched or recruited within the states
of Kentucky and Tennessee.

Third, At the garrison near Vincennes on
the river Wabash, at Fort Massac, New Ma-
drid, Chickasaw Bluffs, Arkansas, Matchez and
Fort Adams, and at any place or places where
troops are or may be stationed, marched or
recruited in the Mississippi territory, except
the county of Washington, and at any place or
places in the Indiana territory south of the
41st degree of north latitude and fifty miles
east of the Mississippi river.

Fourth, At St. Louis, St. Charles, Kaska-
kia, Cahokia, and at any place or places,
where troops are or may be stationed, marched
or recruited within the territory of Louisiana
north of New Madrid, and at any place or
places in the Indiana territory within fifty
miles east of the Mississippi river and south
of the 41st degree of north latitude, Fort Massac
excepted.

Fifth, At New Orleans, Plaquemines, Point
Caupe, Oacheta, Natchitoches, Apollonias,
Arkasaps, Fort Stoddard, Fort St. Stephens,
and at any place or places where troops are or
may be stationed, marched or recruited within
the territory of Orleans, or in the county of
Washington in the Mississippi Territory, and
at any place or places on the west side of the
Mississippi river below Arkansas.

Separate proposals will also be received as
aforesaid for the supply of all rations, which
may be required for the use of the United
States, from the 1st day of January 1866, to
the 31st day of December of the same year,
both days inclusive, within the several states
herein after mentioned, viz:

Sixth, At Fort Wilkinson, Cockspur Island,
and at any place or places where troops are or
may be stationed, marched or recruited, within
the state of Georgia, and on the Indian bound-
ary between Georgia and the Creek nation.

Seventh, At Charleston, Rocky Mount, on
the head waters of the Santee, and at any place
or places, where troops are or may be stationed,
marched or recruited, within the states of
North and South Carolina.

Eighth, At Norfolk, and at any place or
places, where troops are or may be stationed,
marched or recruited, within the state of
Virginia.

Ninth, At Fort M'Henry, and at any place
or places where troops are or may be stationed,
marched or recruited, within the state of
Maryland and the district of Columbia.

Tenth, At Fort Mifflin, and at any place or
places, where troops are or may be stationed,
marched or recruited, within the state of
Pennsylvania, east of the river Susquehanna,
and within the states of New Jersey, and
Delaware.

Eleventh, At Pittsburg, Carlisle, and at
any place or places, where troops are or may
be stationed, marched or recruited, within the
state of Pennsylvania, west of the river Sus-
quehanna.

Twelfth, At Fort Jay, West Point, Albany,
Schoharady, and at any place or places where
troops are or may be stationed, marched or
recruited within the state of New York, Niagara
and its dependencies excepted.

Thirteenth, At Fort Trumbull, Fort Wolcott,
and at any place or places where troops are or
may be stationed, marched or recruited, within
the states of Connecticut, Rhode Island and
Vermont.

Fourteenth, At Fort Independence, (Boston
Island) and at any place or places, where
troops are or may be stationed, marched or
recruited within the state of Massachusetts,
the town of Springfield, and the district of
Maine excepted.

Fifteenth, At Portsmouth, Portland, and at
any place or places, where troops are or may
be stationed, marched or recruited within the state
of New Hampshire and the district of Maine.

Sixteenth, Proposals will also be received
as aforesaid, for the supply of all rations, which
may be required by the U. States, for the troops
which are or may be stationed, marched or
recruited within the town of Springfield in the
state of Massachusetts, and for the armorer &
other persons employed in the United States' ar-
senal at that place, from the 1st day of
January 1865 to the 31st day of December in
the same year, both days inclusive.

A ration to consist of one pound and one
quarter of beef, or three quarters of a pound
of pork, eighteen ounces of bread or flour,
one gill of rum, whiskey or brandy, and at
the rate of two quarts of salt, four quarts of
vinegar, four pounds of soap, and one pound
and a half of candles, to every hundred rations.
The prices of the several component parts of
the ration shall be specified; but the United
States reserve the right of making such altera-
tions in the price of the component parts of the
ration as shall make the price of each part
thereof bear a just proportion to the pro-
posed price of the whole ration. The rations
are to be furnished in such quantities, that there
shall at all times, during the term of the
proposed contract, be sufficient for the con-
sumption of the troops at Michilimackinac,
Detroit and Chicago, for six months in ad-
vance, and at each of the other posts on the
western waters, for at least three months in
advance of food and wholesome provisions.
The same shall be required. It is also to be
permitted to all and every of the commandants
of fortified places or posts, to call for, at sea-
sons when the same can be transported, or any
time in case of urgency, such supplies of
like provisions in advance, as in the discretion
of the commandant shall be deemed proper.

It is further provided that the contractor is to be
bound to the extent and risk of insuring the supplies
of the troops, and that all losses sustained by
the destruction of an enemy, or by means of
the troops of the United States, shall be paid
by the United States at the price of the articles
destroyed or destroyed as aforesaid, on the
condition of ten or more persons of credible
character, and the certificate of a commissioned
officer, stating the circumstances of the loss,
and the amount of the articles for which com-
pensation shall be claimed.

The privilege is understood to be reserved
to the United States of requiring that none of
the supplies, which may be furnished under
any of the proposed contracts, shall be used
until the supplies, which have been or may be
furnished under contracts now in force, have
been consumed; and that a supply in advance
may be always required at any of the fixed
posts on the seaboard, or Indian frontiers not
exceeding three months.
