Gentlemen,

A BALTIMOREAN.

The present winter, since a few days before Christmas, has been one of the most severe experienced for a great many years back. The weather can hardly be said to have settled to that clear sky and moderate cold, a few degrees below the freezing points, which distinguish the winters of this country. There is at present about seven feet of snow in the woods where it does not drift. The usual quantity about the middle of March, when it is generally at the highest, is from four to five feet.

A very deplorable accident happened last week at St. Augustin, a few leagues from this city, a whole family of eight persons, and a woman belonging to the same parish, who lodged in the house, were buried under the ruins of their house, which was crushed to pieces in the night, by the falling of a great body of snow from the Cape under which it was built. The accident was not discovered by the neighbours till the next morning; the place where the house stood was barely discernible; they however proceeded immediately to remove the snow, and the ruins, and were so fortunate as to extricate two of the unfortunate family alive. The mangled bodies of the remainder presented the most affecting sight; and the whole, consisting of a father, mother, four children and the woman who lodged in the house, were taken to the neighbouring church yard the following day and buried in the same grave.

The name of the family is Villeneuve, the woman's name Laurencelle; she has left two children, who lodged with her, but were, providentially, at another house at the time of the accident.
