Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Phi. ladelphia, dated

" MARAGUANE, March 19. "I have the pleasure to inform you of my safe arrival here from Santa Dcmingo, which place I left surrounded by the negroes, within musquet shot of the walls. Though they are numerous, the city will be able to hold out as long as they have provisions. The garrison is strong, say 3000 men, Spanish and French, determined to sell the place as dear as possible. There are now no vessels to take them off; of course, they may as well perish in combat, as be butchered by the negroes, which would doubtless be the case should the city

"General Ferrand has behaved extremely well to the inhabitants. I shall sail to-morrow for N. York, in the sch'r Clorinds."

We understand that at Stafford Court house on Tuesday last, it being court day, a Mr. Jones (without the smallest provocation) stepped up to a Mr. Waugh, and gave him three or four blows with his fist and put a period to his existence. He endeavoured to make his escape, but by the vigilance of some persons was apprehended—a jury was held on the body and brought in a verdict that " Waugh came by his death from the blows received from Jones without any just provocation." He was committed to prison to stand a trial at the next district court. [Virginia Express.

Two vessels have in the course of the present week arrived from Point Petre, Guadaloupe, one of which, whilst lying there, lost three and the other two of their crews with the yellow fever, which it seems existed with symptoms of great virulence. The vessels before reaching any wharf, were remanded to the Laza retto to receive the proper process of purification. I am retailing your cargo of flour on the best terms I can, and have already (since the 22d November) run off 550 barrels, at from 12 90 to 13 dollars; and hope I shall be able to dispose of the remaining few at about the same rates -Your 45 tierces rice remain yet on hand, but I am determined to sell them for the first good offer 'I can obtain We are daily receiving very confiderable supplies of flour and wheat from the different ports of France, by neutral vessels, which of course tends to keep our prices low and discouraging for any speculations from gour side; and for your government I beg leave to inform you, that we have at prefent in this port 220,000 fanegas of wheat (equal to 352,000 bushels) and about 18,000 barrels flour. The wheat is selling at 4 dolls per fanega, equal to 2 50 dolls. per bulhel; and the flour at 12 1-2 to 13 dollars per barrel."
