NEW-YORK, April 15.

By the brig D. M. C. arrived on Saturday from Jamaica, we have received Montego Bay papers of the 16th ult.

Information had been received at Jamaics of the arrival of a French squadron to Wandward; and orders had in consequence been issued, in case of an attack from the Brench, for the troops throughout the island to hold thunselves in readiness to march, at a moment's warning. S.) was boarded on Saturday morning by an English privateer schooner, close in with the Hook, who pressed one man, a native of Digby, named John M'Intyrethe boarding officer informed that the privateer was engaged in pressing men for the Cambrian frigate, and intended shortly to sail for Halifax. The above privateer a few days since took 3 men from the British ship Estherlinde, bound to London, a short time after discharging her pilot. She is said to mount 6 guns and manned with 36 men.
