The law passed by the legislature so materially differs, in many particulars, from the articles subscribed, that the president and directors, on mature consideration, do not think it advisable to accept of, or to assent to the law, in its present form, or until an alteration thereof can be procured; but in all respects to execute the said articles, as far as they have the means to do so, upon the faith of which individuals have subscribed and paid their money.
