BY the articles of association it is provided, that "The President and Directors shall have power to make application to the Legislature of the state, at the next of its assembling session thereof, for an act of incorporation for the said company, on the principles, and with the powers and privileges expressed in the first article of this association, and with such other powers and privileges as they may think advisable; and to consent, on the part of the company, to such terms and conditions for obtaining the said act, as they shall think proper."
In pursuance of the above recited powers, a petition was presented to the Legislature by the president and directors, accompanied with the draft of an act of incorporation, in conformity with the articles of the association. The law passed by the Legislature so materially differed, in many particulars, from the articles subscribed, that the president and directors, on due consideration, do not think it advisable to accept of, or to assent under the law, in its present form, or with an alteration thereof, as has been proposed; but in all respects to execute the said articles, so far as they have the means to do so, upon the faith of which individuals have subscribed and paid their money.
