Triton, Blakeman, of and for New York in a few days; O'Caïn, O'Caïn, and Hazard, Swift, for Boston in 10 days; Hazard, Rowen, of Boston, just arrived from the N. West Coast; Washington, of Boston, just arrived from Batavia, Rousseau, McLeven, of Philadelphia for Europe in 15 or 20 days; Asia, Pearce, of Rhode Island, just arrived. The ship Triton Carberry, sailed from Canton 25 days before the Fanny. On the 29th December the Fanny was forcibly taken possession of by two boat's crews from the British frigate *Caroline*, Page, commander, and detained 4 days in Macao outer road, in a very perilous situation, under pretence of an embargo until the sailing of the British fleet under his convoy. Jan 3, was liberated, and sailed from Macao Road. January 13th, Prince's Island bearing S. W. 6 or 7 leagues, spoke the ship *Betty*, Page, 125 days from Salem for Batavia. Captain Page informed that on the evening before off Java Head, he spoke the ship *Wanderer*, Fitch of Bolton 28 days from Canton for Europe—Feb. 14, in lat. 33. 20, long. 31. 30, spoke the brig *Sufannah* Geddes, 14 days from the Ile of France for New York. February 15, in la. 34. long. 30 spoke the ship *Stranger*, Prescott, of Bolton, 92 days from Canton for New York—captain sick. March 19, in lat. 56. long. 29. 40 fell in with the ship *China* M'Pherson, 100 days from Batavia for Philadelphia. April 1, in lat. 19, long. 58. 30, spoke the brig *Hope* 19 days from Bolton for Grenada. April 8 in lat. 29, long. 67. 30, spoke a schooner (supposed to be the *Lucy*) 15 days from Mar inique for Bolton. Capt. H. informed that at 5 o'clock that morning one of his seamen named Fairweather, being infane, leaped overboard and was drowned.

Also, brig *Lion*, Clark, in 14 days from St. Thomas. Left ship *Madison*, of New York, to sail in 10 days for New Orleans; brig —, Cale of New York; brigs *Performance* Shurtliff for a market; Ann, and a brig just arrived in 10 days, all from Philadelphia; and schooner *William* and *Amuel*, of do. schooner *Eliza Ann* 40 days from New York, having been to Windward, and numerous other American vessels. The brig *Paragon*, from Senegal, sailed from St. Thomas for New York 2 days before the *Lion*, and on the 5th inst. in lat. 21, capt. Clark spoke her three days out.

Brig *Ceres*, Hilliard, in 8 days from Savannah. Left, brig *Augusta*, of Bolton, to sail for New York in 2 days. Ship *Favorite*, Mackie, of New York for Jamaica in 10 days; *Sclair*, Alliance, *Rhea*, of New York for Jamaica in 7 days.

Schooner *David* Clark, Long, in 12 days from Edenton. On Thursday week a New York sloop from Wallington, bound to Charleston, and a ship belonging to Edenton, captain Brown left from the Well Indies, were caught away on Ocracoke Bar. Was boarded off Sandy Hook by the Cambrian's tender.

Sloop *Semiramis*, Slocum, in 6 days from Charleston. The sloop *Venus*, Smith, was to sail the same day for New York. April 17 in lat. 38, 30, spoke the brig *Boston* from George Town for New York.—Off the Hook was boarded by an officer from the British Tender *Fly*, who pressed Seth Marvin, of Blue Point, who had no protection.

Schooner *David*, L'Hommedieu in 2 days from Philadelphia. Passengers, Mr. Cheshire midshipman in the United States Service, and 16 seamen for the frigate *John Adams*.—While at anchor in the Delaware *John Martin* fell overboard and was drowned.

Schooner *Fanny* Sewell, Shepherd in 8 days from Charleston. Passengers, lieut. Murdoch, of the Navy, and 60 seamen and marines for the frigate *John Adams*.

Arrived, yesterday, the brig *Eliza*, Burgess, of Milledore, in 14 days from Havana. Left ships Agent, *Eddy*; *Sally*, *Hills*, and *Nancy*, Stevens, all to sail in 4 days for Bolton; *Charles* Stiles, of Philadelphia, for St. Thomas in 6; *Venelia*, Taber, for Bolton in 8; brigs *Jemima* and *Fanny*, Tatem, for Charleston in 8 days; *Union*, King, for New York, uncertain; *Nancy*, Higgins, of Philadelphia; *S. & W. Bayle*, of Baltimore (arrived); *Dominick*, Frammels, of Philadelphia; *Commodore* Barry, Mead, for do. in 3 days. Markets for all kinds of provisions bad—Flour 16 dollars, subject to a duty of 5 dollars a barrel.

Also, brig *Boston*, Franklin, from Madeira, and 7 days from George Town.

Also schooner *Industry*, Richards, in 15 days from Havana.

Also, schooner *New York*, Thompson, in 8 days from Richmond. Passed the schooner *Caroline*, Dickey, blow Harrison's bar; schooner *Republican*, Smith, at James Town; schooner *Samuel* Hudson at the Point of the shoals; and sloop *Mahala*, Shaw, in Hampton Roads all bound from New York for Richmond. The schooner *Weymouth* was loading for New York. Passing, captain Hammond, who arrived at Hampton Roads in the schooner *Young Lion* from Jamaica, having been put on board her at sea from a French pirate of privateer, by which he was taken. Captain Hammond commanded the schooner *Betty*, of New Bedford, out of New York, and was captured on the 9th of January, on his passage from Jamaica for New York, by the above pirate, called *La Jenny*, capt. Seris. Captain Hammond was detained on board her two months and 30 days, when he was put on board the *Young Lion*. The ship *Commerce*, Rockwell, of New York,

who captured us before mentioned, was on the 30th ult. at Catanzas, Cuba, together with capt. H's schooner. On the 27th ult. the day our informant left the pirate she captured the ship *Benjamin*, Newell, of New York, from the Cape of Good Hope for Havana; and also the schooner *Almira*, from the coast of Africa for Charleston, which vessels they will no doubt plunder, and then run them on shore. Also, sloop *Polly* and *Sally*, from Egg-Harbour, with about 16 tons of Colice, nutmegs, indigo and mace, saved from the ship *Maryland*, from Batavia. It is with regret we have to relate, that this is all that was saved from the valuable cargo of the *Maryland*.
