

General view of New Hampshire Legislature for 1865

GOVERNOR—Hon. John Langdon, re-elected by a majority of one vote from 4630

COUNCIL—Will probably be composed of three republicans, and two federalists.

SENATE—May be fairly calculated to contain seven republican members, to five federalists, and two republicans of other parties.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—Double the majority of last year for republicanism.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in England to his friend in Philadelphia, dated

Edinburgh 14th, 1865.

"I believe I have already informed thee that our committee for the abolition of the Slave trade, lately reformed by a respectable addition of new members, has retained its activity, in consequence of W. Wilberforce's intention to bring the question, this session, under the consideration of parliament. He has already announced it to the house of commons, and he day proposed for the election, been more than once postponed by what is deemed by some more important business. And although his previous experience has evinced that little reliance is to be placed on the non-flattering prospects, even the opponents of the measure admit that there is now a better chance of the success than at any former period. The state of my health of late has not admitted a frequent attendance of the meetings of the committee; but I understand that no much satisfaction was afforded by the reports of your committee of correspondence on some points that further communications on the subject and others mentioned or alluded to in my letter, will be highly acceptable. In mentioning this much to the letter committee, I repeat my request, that in the name of our cause, thou wilt acknowledge the kindness of its communications, and the care we entertain of their importance. The occasion has again drawn to mind Thomas Clarkson, to London, where his assistance is peculiarly acceptable to W. Wilberforce. The able author of the Guide &c. is also very alluded to in the contributions of labor and talent; and I expect will be from thee, from his pen, one of the best of the many valuable tracts, which have been published on this momentous subject.

"John Norton the Methu chief, returned to the vicinity of London and yet unrepentant on the time for embarking on his return home ward. Since our first acquaintance his has been much extended and he is a good deal noticed as an interesting character. He has been employed in the translation of the Gospel of St. John into his own language, and in revising an edition of two thousand copies, printed for the sale of his nation. His translation into English of the epistle written by himself, evinces a capacity for such a work, and induces a hope that it is done properly. As he seems to be so disposed, I doubt not he may be extensively useful in aiding your benevolent endeavors for the civilization of the Indians; and on that account, I have expressed to him my wish that in his way forward he may give the friends, principally active in that concern, opportunities of conference; believing they may prove mutually useful and satisfactory.

Extract of a letter from a merchant in London to his correspondent in this city dated January 30, 1865.

"The ravages which the yellow fever has made in South America, & that of Europe have spread such terrors in the interior of Germany, that feverish edicts have been issued with respect to the importation of goods from places where this scourge has prevailed, and you are well acquainted with the fact, being as yet left with the ensuing summer, the contagion might be imported by goods coming from foreign countries."

"Though these edicts are chiefly directed against the importation of merchandise from Spain & Italy, yet the officers in the different ports of Germany have also received orders to extend the same to any goods coming from the United States and West Indies."

"Ships from Baltimore, I conceive will not be liable to a long quarantine, as the fever did not exist in that city last year, but I cannot too strongly recommend the providing that the company with bills of health, and to the officers under the strict injunction of avoiding during passage, all intercourse with vessels coming from countries infested last year with the contagion. It is equally requisite that the different articles of the cargo be provided with proper documents proving that the fever came from no country where the fever existed last year."

"With regard to such goods as are most apt to imbibe the plague, viz. cotton wool, hides, dry East India goods and others of the same nature, the above mentioned certificate cannot be too clear, in stating, that they neither came from, nor had been at, a place suffering last year with the fever, but even the vessel having such goods on board, cannot avoid a detention in unloading."
