Arrived this day, the schooner Joanna, captain Henry Quiner, having picked up on the eastern part of the Grand Bank of Newfoundland, the yawl of the thip Jupiter late of New York with the ciptain, mate, one seaman and five passengers, which this was foundered by the ice at 12 o'clock on the night of the 6th inflant, on hir passage from London to New Yor, having on board 73 fouls, 27 of whom were lost in the thip, 38, including the second mate and remainder of he crew, took to the long bost, which p-rted company from the yawl, on Monday the 8th in heavy squalls, after having left the ice that morning.

W. from the time of leading the thip; at 12, finding after we had cle red the ice, a rough sea beginng to make, so that the yawl was unfafe n tow, and they not being willing to increase their number in the long boat, r quefied him o cut us adrift, when they immediately left us steering north with a f il fet, and a fr fh breeze from the fouthward; our fitnation was now fuch, that we wer, obliged to keep before the wind, it being very foundly with heavy rain, and the yawl being so de: ply laden as to make us ap prehensive that the would im in d ately fill Abou sunset he wind abated, and the fea moderated. so hat we were enabled to pull to the westward, which we did fr m 7 o'clock intil 8 4. M in Tuesday, the 9th, when we had the happiness to disc ver a fail which we tound to be the schooner Joanna, cap:ain Q iner, who humanely receiv dus on box d, and paid us every attention wiich was in his power, and which our situation after suffering much from fatigue and being confiderably injured by frost, rendered necessary for the preservation of our lives.

After calling heir attention to crimes c ministed against the laws of he United States, which came under tieir cognizance, and which he particularly noticed - murder treason and piracy, he informed them he need not dilate on, as there had no come within his knowledge any case for their notice -Any breach of the revenue laws would be brought before them by the proper efficers, and observed, that any information required by them would be given by tre court when wanted. He particularly directed, that in all cases they were to hear the evidence on the part of the United States only, and in any case, where he evidence was doubtful, they were not to find a bill; as their not finding one did not establish innocence, but only proved that there was not evidence sufficient to find a bill -- He particularly noticed that an union of the flates thould always be advacated, and that the laws thould ever be supported as the only certain seturity of peace and ordereven admitting that those laws were un jult, unconstitutional or oppressive; and declared it his opinion. that it was no their duty to enquire into the constitution ality of laws, but to support them, as mide by hose whose peculiar province was to enact them .. & itrongly recommend. ed the encouragemen of morali y as the thee anchor of our political security and happiness.


