### SHIP NEWS

#### Port of Baltimore.

From Bryden's Marine List.

May 6.

Arrived, sch'r. Enterprize, Trav-rse, 17 days from Basseterre, Guad.—coffee and sugar—Phil. Rogers. Sailed 19th April. Left no Baltimore vessels, except the Dorchester, which was to sail the same day. Left several northern vessels, names unknown. Spoke nothing on the passage, except an English ship of war, who boarded us off St. Thomas, and informed that he had sent in two American vessels to Tortola the day before, the one a four the other not mentioned under pretence of having French property on board. In Canton, of Baltimore, was sent into Point Petre about the 12th April.

Arrived, ship Carlisle, Gibson 66 days from London—bale goods, &c. Sailed from Gravesend 1st March. Left the Hazard Point 26th March; was brought too by the privateer Lancaster, of Liverpool and treated politely. The island of Corvo bearing W. S. W. about 4 leagues, 30th March, lat. 39.4 long 36.22 was bro't too by an armed brig of 12 guns, who shewed no colors, and ordered us to send our boat on board; while we were clearing our boat, the wind shifted in a equal to N. E. and rendered it impossible to hoist out our boat; the privateer then bore down upon us, and said he was going to steer fourth, and that we must follow till daylight, it being then about sundown: I told him, I was bound to the westward and could not be answerable to run so much out of my course; he answered that if I did not follow him immediately, he would fire into me; he then bore away south, beckoning me to follow immediately; I then steered west, and in one minute

received a shot through my fore lay, I followed, and was fired at a dozen times in the course of the night, and after following him 74 miles out of my way, was at liberty to proceed on my voy ge.

April 17th, lat. 34. 9, long 60, 1. Spoke ship Stafford, Driscoll, from Baltimore, bound to Cadiz out 7 days, all well. 25th, 93 leagues west of Cape James. Spoke ship Do orby, Hayes, 36 hours from Philadelphia to Canton, all well; 27th, on foundings, spoke ship Sophy, from New York, to New Orleans, 2 days out.

#### Newburyport, April 29.

Arrived (at quarantine) brig Hazard, Call, 20 days from St. Marks. (His.) Left ship America, Starrett, of Philadelphia, left at the Cape Jan 16—ship Marquis Eames, of Boston, to sail on 10 or 11 weeks.—Spoke April 15 a brig bound to Baltimore, being one of the convoy, which informed that the fleet were all safe, and close behind her—27th, a ship from Danbury, bound to New York, 28th, ship Thomas, Gardner from Liverpool, 50 days out, and supplied her with provisions.

The Plato fell in with ice, and got through it with much difficulty.
