one's own existence is at stake. But in this instance it is easy to show that Vattel and Montesquieu perfeculv agree. Vuttel, fo far from justifying the violent seizure of the Spa illi frigates, completely condemns it; he means by the detention of thips or merchandise, only the suspension of the departure of the foreign thips which the off nded state has in its ports, or of the merchandise it has within its dominions. This detention is evidently nothing more than the measure of embargo, which is frequently made use of at the eve of a war. This detention presents nothing violent. Resistance in such case being useless, no effusion of blood is to be apprehended. Properly speaking, nothing can be detained but what one already has in one's power. But whenever resistance is presumable, the seizure can with no man ner of propriety be termed a detension, it is manifellly an open attack. But, said some members of the house of lords, the English government should have sent a sufficient sorce to prevent all idea of resistance on the part of the Spanish ships. In the first place, however numerous the English men of war may be, they are tuilicient to be spread over the woole ocean in Superior force to the fleets they may fall in with; secondly it is not cultomary for Hips of war to furrender without firing a thot. There are, on the one hand, a thoufand examples in the history finavigation of simple frigates efcaping from very unequal fights; and on the other, there is not a fingle inflan e of an Admiral having ibrrendered at such infol-nt intimations as the English Admirals had orders to make to the spanish ships. The mon reasonable eproach to be made to the ministers would doubtlels be their not having ordered the English Admirals to refrain from lum moning the Spaniards, if resistance was pretumable. But in this case the measure would have been almost illusory, a d Bri tith cupidity could not have accommodated itselt. Besides, it is the spirit which dictated the inhuman order, it is the fatal confequences which may refult from it in the relations between nations that should be principally considered. It is this anti-sociai lynem which renders peace more dangerous than war, that thould be unveiled to all nations After this, the English ministry affect to be astonished that the Manifelio of his Catholic Majetty should have roused a noble indignation in all hearts; certainly there would be more realem for being attentified were it not to acccomplish the hopes it has raised, and where the generous flight of the Soavith nation not followed by a speedy and terrible vengeance.


