From a London paper.
A new species of trick has been prac-
ticed in the city within this day or two:
A man who wore regimentals, and passed
himself off for a soldier, as he was walking
along the quays, in the evening, suddenly
dropped down on the foot path, apparently
with great violence, and after making
a few grimaces cried out loudly that his
thigh was broken. His piteous cries soon
brought round him a crowd of persons,
who sincerely commiserated his situation.
Some of them offered to take him home in
a coach, and others to convey him to a
furniture shop. To the former he replied, "it
would be of no avail to take him home as
he has no comforts to go to;" and to the
latter he observed, "he has no money to
pay for surgical assistance, but would be
grateful to any one who would help him to
St. Bartholomew's Hospital." Several
persons immediately offered their assistance.
A furniture shopkeeper, before whose house
he lay, took a door off the hinges, to carry
him to the Hospital; but before the sup-
posed invalid could be placed on the door,
some person brought an arm chair to place
him in, that he might be removed with
more ease and comfort. Being feasted, and
about to be taken away, a subscription was
let on foot for him by the bystanders, who
had listened to his sad story of poverty.
The sum of nineteen shillings was collect-
ed, which the fellow put into his pocket;
then lifting a groan, with great seeming
difficulty, he muttered "God reward you
my friends," and was taken to the hospi-
tal where he was laid upon a bed, in the
room appropriated to accident patients.—
One of the Surgeons presently attended
and examined the limb complained of
immutely. "I do not perceive, friend,"
said the Surgeon, "that you have broken
any bones or received even the smallest
contusion; and if you have any just cause
of complaint, I must confess it is beyond
my skill to find it out." "That may be,"
replied the soldier, "but your honor may
trust me. I have not cried out all this time
for nothing." The Surgeon depending
upon his own judgement and feeling a
trick, desired that the man might be kept
all night, and that the people would watch
him. At supper time the invalid said he
would try to eat a little, as he had not
broken his fast all day soon after he ob-
served to the nurse who was left to attend
him, that he began to think the gentleman
a very good judge, and now fully agreed
with him, that neither his leg nor thigh
was broken, as he felt as if he could walk
a little. That being the case, he thought
it best not to give the house any further
trouble, and would, therefore, go home di-
rectly. The nurse replied, that after the
orders she had received, she could not suf-
fer him to depart that night; besides, if
he were willing, the watchman who guard-
ed the gate, would not permit him to pass.
The soldier then requested to go down and
speak to the watchman, and he had no
doubt of getting him into the humour to
let him out. He then went down stairs,
and applied to the watchman, who refused
to allow him to pass without orders. "Be
quiet," said the soldier, "I have something
here (feeling at the same time under his
jacket) that will do as well as an order."
"No, friend," replied the other, "bribery
won't seduce me." "You may call this
what you please, Mr. Watchman," rejoined
the soldier, "I have only to say,
either let me pass through this gate, or
this bayonet shall pass through your bod-
y." The threat had the desired effect;
and although the watchman sprung his
rattle before the impostor had proceeded
many paces, yet such was his speed that he
could not be overtaken.

LONDON, March 19.
In the expedition fitting out at Portf-
mouth, which is generally supposed to be
destined for the Mediterranean, Sir T.
Stuart goes out as second in command.
Cowes, March 17—Arrived the Riffing
Scotts, Braddon, from Charleston, with
rice, and immediately went to perform
quarantine; also the American ship Ben-
gal, from Canton, with teas.

March 20
We have been favored with the sight of
letters brought by the Diana packet, from
Lisbon, which brings intelligence of a
very late date from the coasts of Spain and
Portugal, and sufficiently show how little
credit ought to be given to the accounts in
the official papers of the French gov-
ernment, stating the destruction of the
whole of our fleet from Malta.

The Gottenburg mails arrived yester-
day. A Russian messenger is also said to
have arrived, and that he is the bearer of
dispatches of great importance. If any
such courier have arrived, we do not be-
lieve that the expected treaty has been
received by him; a document of such
extraordinary importance would agreeably
to the known practice of the court of
St. Petersburg, be transmitted, most
probably, by a messenger of higher con-
sideration.

The channel fleet sailed from Torby on
Sunday for their station off Brest.
Lord Grenville gave notice last night in
the house of peers, that he should, on
Monday next, present a petition from the
Irish Roman Catholics. His lordship add-
ed, he should refrain from making any
observations on that occasion, and should
give ample notice of the day on which the
discussion of this subject will take place.
Mr. Fox gave a familiar notice in the house
of commons.

March 21.
House of Commons, Wednesday, March 20.
Mr. Rose moved, that the house do, to-
morrow, go into a committee to consider
of the order of council for granting per-
mission to neutral ships to trade to and
from Spain. Order'd

A cabinet council was held yesterday at
the Foreign Office, and was attended
(with the exception of the lord chancellor)
by every member; namely, the lord pre-
sident, the chancellor of the exchequer,
duke of Montrose, earls of Buckingham-
shire, Hatham Westmoreland, and Cam-
den; Viscounts Melville & Castlereagh;
and Lords Hawkesbury and Mulgrave.
The council sat nearly three hours. It is
conjectured that the dispatches brought by
the Russian messenger who arrived the
preceding day formed the subject of delib-
eration. Immediately on the council
breaking up, a messenger was ordered to
be in readiness to set off for the continent.
We have received Dutch Journals of a
later date than those which arrived on
Saturday. They do not furnish any in-
telligence of moment.
It is announced under the head of
Frankfort, that every thing has been
tranquil in the kingdom of Naples, since
the interview of prince Cardito, with the
French general.

Parma it is asserted, will be incorporat-
ed with the intended kingdom of Lombardy;
and it was expected that Bonaparte's
journey thither would not be delayed be-
yond the present month, as it had been
officially notified that he would be at Ly-
ons before the 22d inst.

The French Ambassador, Semonville,
took his final departure from the Hague
on the 8th inst. It was generally believed
that the new constitution had been secretly
printed, preparatory to its being submitted
for approbation.
Yesterday a court of directors was held
at the East-India house, when marquis
Cornwallis was introduced and took the
oath, on being appointed to the govern-
ment general of Bengal.
