The three's are narrow; in the greater part of them there are brick arches supported on pillars so toat the pissengers are in some measure thelered from the fun. Two lireets in particular are remarkable for the richnels and elegance of the shops which adorn turns One of hem is called the Capmakers, after the people who inhabit it, and who supply all Bombay and the Levant with red cips: and the other the Gold fmiths, in which may be found all forts of pearls and precious ones in grea abundance. As no foreigner is allowed to see the mosques. I shall fay not ing more of them than they are pritty well built. is to the sterples, they differ no otherwise from those of the Turks than in being of an octagonal form, and covered with delft ware. There is no witer here but rain water, which is preserved with great care.

"The turrounding country, which is very sertile, and well cultivated, abounds with a profusion of fruit, such as almonds. pears, apples, plums, figs, apricots, grapes, melons, &c. The trade of this place consills in horses, wool, eggs, ostrich feathers, black foap, corn, olives, oil, dates, &c.


