She sigh'd to the notes of the wild whippoorwill.  
All nature was silent to hear her complain,  
But soon she scud home, for it look'd like to rain.

**From the Norfolk Public Ledger.**  
By a gentleman from St. Thomas, we  
are obligingly informed of some circum-  
stances respecting the defeat of the Hayti-  
ans before the city of St. Domingo, by the  
garrison under command of the brave  
Ferrand; who, on this occasion it is said,  
displayed all the qualifications of a con-  
summate general and all the firm intrep-  
idity of real courage.  
When the negro army appeared off the  
city, and were in a condition to attack it,  
a summons was sent to the following pur-  
port—"JEAN JACQUES, the first, emper-  
or of Hayti, to general Ferrand, com-  
manding a division of the troops of the  
French republic. As it is inconsistent  
with the laws and independence of the  
empire, that any portion of the French  
army should be allowed to remain in the  
island, general Ferrand is summoned to  
surrender the city of St. Domingo in  
twenty-four hours; if at the end of that  
time the city shall not be evacuated, it  
will be delivered up to plunder, and all the  
inhabitants thereof be put to the sword.  
It being difficult to procure any person  
who would risk the delivery of a suitable  
answer to this demand, the commandant  
ordered three cannon that to be levelled at  
the black camp, which conveyed a defini-  
tive answer in terms as strong as the pen could have  
done, and doubtless as well understood.  
The action was fought on the plain of  
St. Charles, on the 28th of March. The  
resources not less than the courage of  
Ferrand and his associates is seen in his  
brilliant means, with so small an army, to  
defeat every part of the city and to make  
a sortie against a too numerous, so  
desperate, and so insatiable ferocious and  
vengeance. Seconded by a little band of  
volunteers he, however, attacked & successively  
carried every intrenchment of the enemy.  
His second in command leading the attack  
on the first line received a very severe wound,  
not discouraging he led them on to the  
second, where he received several others;  
still concealing his situation from his com-  
panions, he conducted them to the third,  
in carrying which he received a musket  
ball the lower viscera, of which he almost  
instantly died. From the Spanish troops  
but he aid was received in the first and  
partial engagements with the blacks but  
in this decisive one, the presence of their  
commander, whom they loved and feared,  
animated them to actions which seemed to  
be inspired by a desire to surpass their  
French comrades.

The defeat was complete. 1500 brigands  
were counted dead on the field of battle;  
all their ammunition, a large portion of  
their military stores, their magazines of  
provisions, and the military chest and  
treasure of the emperor, fell into the  
hands of the victor; whose loss in the  
battle did not exceed 80 men.  
The fleet of admiral Mefflin (or Miniflin)  
arrived on the day of the battle or the day  
succeeding, but had not at the time landed  
any troops. The ships did not come to  
anchor, but after putting the aids which  
they had for the garrison on shore stood  
out to sea.  
We understand that the inhabitants of  
St. Domingo have been invited to return;  
as the siege is raised, and the army of  
Desfils has completely withdrawn.  
Admiral Cochrane touched at Saint  
Thomas, in pursuit of the French squad-  
ron; but not finding it there, continued  
his course for St. Domingo.

**NEW-YORK, May 8.**  
Captain Beare, who arrived here yester-  
day, has favored us with Irish papers to  
the 23d March, inclusive, but they con-  
tain nothing later from London than be-  
fore received. We have made some ma-  
rine extracts from them.  
On the 13th of April, in lat. 42, 30,  
long 49, captain Beare fell in with ice  
lands of ice but got clear of them in about  
24 hours.—While he was in the ice, he  
saw a ship's yawl bottom upwards.  
The ship Merchant, M'Laughlin, in 40  
days from Liverpool, arrived at Boston the  
29th ult. captain Beare, of this city, who  
came passenger in her, came to town yester-  
day, and informs us, that he failed the  
20th of March. The ship John Morgan,  
of this port, in coming out at night, struck  
on a sand bank but was got off with little  
damage, and went into dock to repair.—  
Capt. Beare mentions, that the Merchant  
was furrowed with ice for five days, from  
the lat. of 46, 20, to 42, 10. The last  
ice island he saw was in the lat. of 52, 20;  
failed in company with the ship Fame of  
Baltimore, and spoke her in lat. 42, 10,  
then 29 days out. The Hudson, Bool, for  
New York, failed the 19th March. The  
ships Hardware and William Penn, of N.  
York, were to fail the 29th. A ship be-

longing to New York failed with the Mer-  
chant, bound to Cadiz. The ship Alexan-  
der Hamilton, from New York, arrived the  
16th March.  
Captain Beare was at Amsterdam the 7th  
of March, and informs us that Schuimel-  
penick had arrived in that city, and that  
a change in the government would take  
place in about a week from that date. A  
body of 3000 French troops, under the  
command of Gen. Marmont, was ordered  
towards the Hague from Utrecht to pre-  
vent any insurrection of the inhabitants.  
An embargo was to take place at Am-  
sterdam about the 14th or 15th of March.  
Five fail of the line & a number of trans-  
ports were ready for sea. The British  
squadron under the command of Admiral  
Ruffell, was at anchor outside the harbor.  
On the 7th of March there were eighteen  
fail of American vessels ready for sea at  
that port—amongst them were the ships  
Martha, and Rover of New York, expect-  
ed to fail the 15th of that month.

By the ship Young Factor, we learn,  
that the squadron under the command of  
Admiral Cochrane, parted Nevis for the  
leeward on the 11th of April; and it was  
reported that they had fallen in with the  
French Squadron off Cape Francois.  
A letter from B-Hall, dated March 19,  
quotes New York Flaxseed at 61 5/8 per  
cask; Dutch do 81. 10s. Bowed Georgia  
Cotton Wool, 23d per lb New-Orleans  
do 26d. Potash 60s. to 65s per cwt. Li-  
nens of every kind high and in good de-  
mand  
**OUTRAGE.**—Captain Williams, of  
the pilot boat Ich. Geyh and arrived at  
New York in 16 days from Cape Francois,  
informs that a brig commanded by captain  
Bell failed from Turks Island the day be-  
fore he arrived there having on board the  
crew of a Baltimore schooner from St. Do-  
mingo, captured by a French privateer.  
After they were captured the Frenchmen  
gave the captain, mate, and supercargo  
each three dozen lathe, and the crew six  
dozen. The wounds of some of them had  
mortified, and it was expected they would  
not survive.

May 9.  
Captain Williams of the Grey Hound,  
informs, that the French privateer (formerly  
the British sloop of war Lilly) was  
blown up on the 12th of April, after an  
action of an hour and half with the British  
sloop of war Reynard. Captain Ogilby,  
about forty miles to the northward of the  
Mona Passage. The Lilly had on board  
160 men, 60 of whom were killed during  
the engagement, 40 were saved, and the  
rest were left when she blew up.  
He also informs, that it was reported at  
the Cape, that the Spaniards had evacu-  
ated the City of St. Domingo.  
Extract of a letter from Boston to the edi-  
tor of the Mercantile Advertiser, dated  
Sunday afternoon May 2.

"This afternoon arrived here the ship  
Alert, captain Lewis from St. Domingo,  
via Halifax 7 days from the latter place.  
Passengers, Mr. Charles Hill, Mr. Tho-  
mas Boggs, Mrs. Cochran and daughters,  
and twenty eight of the crew of the brig  
Happy Couple of New York which vessel  
was condemned some time since. The  
Prince Ernest packet had just arrived at  
Halifax from England, and was to fail  
immediately for N. York. Left under ad-  
judication, ship John. Patterson, of New  
York, from New Orleans for Bordeaux;  
schr. Success, of Philadelphia, from Guada-  
loupe; ship Orleans, of do. from Mar-  
seille; and schr. Harmony, of Alexandria  
from St. Martins, all detained on account  
of having French property on board; and  
the brig Alliance of Baltimore, for His-  
paniola, on account of being armed."  
Extract from a letter, of a late date, from  
Bordeaux.

"Our Consul seized here a few days  
since, the ship Eagle, belonging formerly  
to a house in Philadelphia.—This vessel  
was sold here to a Frenchman in 1802,  
who was now fitting her out under her old  
American papers, which had never been  
given up, and had taken in a cargo.—I  
am told he has got hold to day of another  
vessel at the mouth of the river.—A few  
weeks since he gave consular papers to a  
ship purchased apparently by a house in N.  
York, from whom they had the power of  
attorney for that purpose.—the ship in-  
stead of going to N. York, was sent to  
Spain, and there fitted out as a privateer;  
the captain on his return was arrested by  
the consul, and held in custody until he  
produced the papers; and the merchants  
who expected the vessel are not suffered to  
pass any papers in the Consul's office.—  
He refuses to take their oaths, or to certi-  
fy their bills of lading. This puts them  
to much trouble, as they deal much with  
the United States, and one of the partners  
is an American."

**PHILADELPHIA, May 10.**  
A Hamburg paper of the 6th of  
March, states, that Dutch rescriptions;  
negotiated by the French, and payable  
three years after the conclusion of peace,  
have risen, in consequence of sanguine  
hopes being entertained that peace is at  
hand, five per cent.  
Extract of a letter from the Mediter-  
ranean.  
"We understand that the U. State's  
brig Argus, Captain Hull, has been or-  
dered to Egypt, where she is expected to  
take on board the Ex-Bashaw of Tripoli,  
who, under the guidance of a special
