NEW-YORK May 15.

Captain Morgan who arrived yesterday from Jamaica has favouied us with papers to the 21st ult. They contain several narine and other articles; which we have extracted. Captain M. informs, that there had been an embargo and martial law at Jamaica for 25 days, which was raised on the 21st of April. Adviral Cochrane's fleet, having been joined at Barbadoes by he Centau, of 74 guns and Ciree frigate from England touched at Jamaica on the 18th April, and proceeded immediately in purtuit of the French squadron Commodore Hood sailed for England on the 18 h of April. Proclama tions had been issued, prohibiting the ex. portation of provisions from Jamaica for fix weeks. The news of the French fleet being off St. Domingo reached Jamaica, on the first ult. when the embargo was laid.
