BOSTON, May 14.
FROM FRANCE.
By the arrival of the brig Orlando, cap-
tained by Cottle, yesterday, in 35 days from Mor-
laix, we have been favoured with a file of
the *Journal du Commerce* to the 30th of
March, Paris dates.
We find the whole attention of French-
men again occupied with another event of
glory, which shortly awaits their beloved
Emperor. The Cardinal Fesch, and M.
de Segur, Grand Master of Ceremonies,
had departed for Milan, on their route to
attend the Coronation of Bonaparte as
KING OF ITALY!
The Tribune had resolved, on the moti-
on of their President, to wait upon the Em-
peror in their corporate capacity to felici-
tate his Majesty, on the glorious occasion.
The Cardinal Caprara, Archbishop of
Milan, is to officiate at the coronation of
Bonaparte, and his First Chamberlain M.
Remusat who is appointed to convey the
ornaments to be used at the ceremony, has
already left Paris.
In General Orders, dated on board "The
Imperial Flotilla at Boulogne" the 22d of
March, Admiral Lacrosse announces to the
squadron his appointment to succeed Ad-
miral Bruix, who died on the 17th of Fe-
bruary.
Captain Cottle informs, that previous to
his failing a Fleet of 22 sail had put to
sea from Brest, but on discovering an En-
glish squadron, they RETURNED TO PORT.
Very little success, is said in the latest
papers, respecting En land or war.

NEW-YORK, May 16.
Yesterday afternoon, the French, or
Spanish, privateer, which robbed the
ship Sanion, and several other vessels on
the coast within the last two weeks, came
to anchor within Sandy Hook.
News (it is verbal) is received by the
ship Two Friends, from Belfast, that the
Brest fleet was out in chase of the British
Channel fleet!!! Capt. Latham brought
no news-papers.
The subjoined papers we received yester-

Havana:

Havana, April 10, 1865.
SIR—Your fellow-citizens of the United
States, at present in this city, impre-
sioned with a deep sense of the situation in-
to which our public affairs, and your and
their private interests have been placed by
the measures which have been enforced
against you by some of the officers of this
government, take the occasion which is
thus presented, for expressing the senti-
ments which those measures have excited.
Desirous of giving our united and indi-
vidual support to a public agent of our
country, we feel particularly anxious to
extend it to one for whom we entertain
great personal respect and esteem.
In a review of your management of the
concerns of our nation (which many of us
have witnessed for a very considerable
length of time) we perceive the most pub-
lic spirited and disinterested motives influ-
encing your conduct; and we are equally
fixed in the belief, that in no instance
whatsoever, have you given just cause to
this government for even a suspicion of a
breach of its laws. Confident also, that
in a further investigation of the matter,
which has been ostensibly placed as the
ground of the late proceedings against you
none will be found really to exist, we can-
not but lament, that steps so hasty, in
their consequences so unpleasant, and so
injurious to yourself and detrimental to
the commercial interests of our common
country, should have been adopted.
We offer to you, Sir, under all circum-
stances which shall arise, the continuance
of our support; and our best wishes for
your happiness and welfare.

address of this date, in behalf of the Ame-
rican merchants and masters of vessels,
now in this port.
I want words to express the high sense
I have of so decided and unequivocal ap-

veys.
Conscious that I have at all times and
in every instance wherein the interests of
my fellow-citizens were concerned, acted
faithfully and to the best of my abilities
in the promotion thereof, I cannot but feel
gratified in your approbation. Equally
conscious that I have in all my opera-
tions, both public and private, avoided
every ground that could offer even a suspi-
cion of interfering with, or evading the
observance of the laws of this colony, I
cannot but be pleased with the confidence
you have expressed in my integrity.
With such consciousness and such sup-
port, the tongue of malice, or the arbitra-
ry measures of a government, cannot ef-
fect the peace of my own mind, or the sa-
credness of my own reputation. I leave
them both in the hands of that providence,
whose penetrating eye directs all sub-
lunary affairs, and can justly estimate the
workings of the human heart.
I reciprocate, Gentlemen, with the ut-
most sincerity, the good wishes you have

conveyed to me, in ardently desiring the
advancement of your individual welfare
and happiness.

WASHINGTON CITY, May 17.
So far as we have received details of
the elections in Virginia, they evince a
considerable accession of strength to re-
publican principles. Of the twenty two
representatives sent to Congress but one
is federal. As there were 3 federal mem-
bers in the last delegation, this change
will make a difference of four votes in that
body.
We have received a letter from a cor-
respondent in Berkeley county, heretofore
the boast of federalism, which has chosen
this year by a small majority the republi-
can candidate, Mr. Kaulome, member of
Assembly.
In the district composed of the counties
of Berkeley, Jefferson and Hampshire, Mr.
John Morrow republican, is chosen a re-
presentative in congress, in the room of
Mr. Stephenson, by a majority of about
100; last year Mr. Stephenson had a
larger majority over the republican candi-
date.

The following is the verdict of the co-
roner's inquest held over the body of Mary
Todd alias Mary Smith who was found
dead in bed on Thursday morning last.
That Mary Todd, alias Mary Smith,
came to her death, some time in the morn-
ing of the 15th inst. by being suffocated,
strangled and hanged by the neck with a
small rope or cord, and that, from the cir-
cumstantial evidence before us we are of
opinion that a certain JAMES TODD, was
accessory to the act of suffocating, strangling
and hanging the said Mary, by which
said strangling and hanging, the said Mary
instantly died.
We learn that James Todd has been
committed to goal, to stand trial at the
next criminal court
It may be necessary to observe that this
is the same case which one report made
suicide "by spiritous liquors" and another
"by laudanum."

The ship Two Friends left Belfast on
the 13th of April—Our files of papers
by her extend only to the 4th of that
month, and we do not learn that she has
brought any later.—The captain informs
us that the Brest fleet of twenty-five sail
were out, and that they were in pursuit
of the British channel fleet, which com-
piled of only nineteen—[Merc. Adv.]
[That the French fleet are out of
Brest, as mentioned in our paper a few
days ago, received by a dispatch vessel at
Martinico, seems to be confirmed by the
above, as also the extract of a letter
from which the British admiral ordered his
advance ships "to haul off" from the
French fleet—From all the accounts,
there appears little doubt, but we may
hourly look for some interesting intelli-

By a gentleman from the lower part of
this State, intelligence has been received,
that a war council, consisting of about 500
Indians has lately been held at the mouth
of the Wabash river. This convocation
is said to consist of deputies from all the
North Western tribes.—The object of this
meeting is, to deliberate on the subject of
going to war against the Osage Indians,
up the Missouri, a nation with whom they
have long been at enmity. It was remark-
ed by a gentleman present at the convoca-
tion, to a chief, that as Mr. Jefferson was
of a pacific temper, and averse to the ef-
fusion of blood, he would very probably
use his exertions to prevent hostilities.—
But the Indians appeared to think that
the president had no right to interfere in a
matter that peculiarly related to their own
sovereignty
